

GIANTS DID AS THEY PREDICTED.

In World's Championship Game
New Yorkers Shut Out
Philadelphia.

MATHEWSON IS RESPONSIBLE.

He Pitched a Masterly Game and Allowed Only Four Hits—Phillies Played Fine Game.

Philadelphia, Oct. 9.—Masterly pitching by Christy Mathewson, backed up by glibbed playing by the men behind him, gave the New York National league champions a victory today over the Philadelphia American league pennant winners in the first of the series of seven games for the world's championship.

Philadelphia failed to score, Mathewson allowing the home team only four hits, while the New Yorkers managed to get three runs off Plank. Although defeated, Philadelphia played a brilliant game.

New York's great pitcher pounced down the home players in almost one two-thirds of the thirty-one games he has faced him only eight reached first, four of them on hits, three on fielders' choices and one on Jimmie Sherrin's muffed third, which was thrown out at the plate on a close play.
