He first bought the shop in which he had lo-cated and then set agents afoot to pur-chase the whole of those properties sur-rounding it. The deal was eventually successful and Jack Wren became the owner of an entire block of stores and tenement houses. Preparations were then forwarded to-ward the construction of a police-proof totalizator, and the work was carried out quietly and without display. The owner of this one-time yard, which never carried above 52 worth of stock, was a paid employe of Wren's and clients of the "tote" had first to pass this man before access could be gained.
