COMPLICATED MONEY DEAL. Bridwell Will Show, He Says, That The Board Lost No Money.

H. W. Nichols, who, through mistake, was paid twice by the board of education for drawing some plans for the manual training classes, was called to testify in the investigation last night held by the board of education. In regard to this Mr. Nichols said that he had been paid by Mr. Bridwell, superintendent of buildings, before his claim had passed the board of education. This amounted to \$51.75. Later he received a notice from L. P. Judd, clerk of the board, he said, that there was some money for him at the office. Nichols called and received the amount which was \$51.75. When he received the money the second time he thought that it was for overtime, he said, until he looked the matter up on his books the next day. He discovered the mistake then and took the money back and gave it to Mrs. Bridwell.

At a former investigation Mr. Bridwell admitted receiving this money from Nichols. Bridwell said at that time that he had advanced the money to Nichols out of his own personal accounts as he intended to show. The money that Nichols received from the board Bridwell credited to his own account to reimburse himself for the same amount which he advanced to Nichols. In this Bridwell intended to show by his books that the board of education lost nothing through the transaction. Bridwell says that Nichols signed the receipt after he had been paid in advance and then signed a voucher in the clerk's office. In this manner the records in the clerk's office show that Nichols was paid twice, but in reality he lost nothing.

CADETS WILL GO TO SEATTLE FAIR

Governor Spry Addresses the Battalion at High School.

WILL REPRESENT THE STATE.

He Assures the Young Soldiers That Their Trip is Certain and Advices Hard Work.

Gov. Spry addressed a meeting of the high school cadets held in the assembly hall at the high school yesterday, upon the prospective trip of the cadets to the Seattle exposition. Gov. Spry assured the cadets that they would be able to attend the exposition to represent the high school and the State of Utah. The governor said he had a pride in the cadets, and that the citizens of the state remembered with pride the trip of the boys to San Francisco and hoped for just as much from the trip to Seattle.

Thomas Hull of the Utah State Fair association also addressed the boys on the business end of the trip. Mr. Hull stated that \$35,000 had already been raised of the \$50,000 required to make the trip. Mr. Hull also encouraged the boys to keep up their drilling through the summer, for the object was well worth the extra effort to keep in shape for the fair.

Commandant W. C. Webb and Principal George A. Eaton made brief talks to the cadets. It was stated that of 123 battalion, now numbering 200, 150 are veterans of the San Francisco trip. From the third and fourth year students the ranks will be recruited to 375, including the cadets who will, of course, go along. The cadets now have \$5,000 and the balance will be solicited from wealthy citizens of the state. No general campaign of soliciting will be instituted, but any offering will be appreciated. The boys will have to raise \$10 each, while the committee will do the rest.

The salaries were fixed at \$75 a year in each case except Mr. Andrew King, Jr., who was appointed a probation officer of Cache county at a yearly salary of \$500. Governor Spry held a conference with the county commissioners yesterday in regard to appointing a clerk for the Salt Lake juvenile court. The commissioners refused to pay the clerk's salary under the new law, which is held to be indefinite. It is believed, however, that a satisfactory arrangement will be made in a few days to secure a clerk for the court.
