## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**GRAND BALL.**—The Ball in the Theatre to-night is to be very select, and those who attend will doubtless enjoy themselves. These parties held in the Theatre offer facilities for enjoyment such as no others can, and were it not for the great scarcity of money, there is not a doubt but that they would be crowded. We hope the attendance to-night will be worthy of the enterprise displayed by those who have been to the trouble and expense of getting it up.

**LAND OWNERS OF THE 7TH WARD PASTURE.**—An anxiety has been manifested by many of the land owners of the 7th Ward pasture to take steps to secure the land from the trespass of loose animals, so that a crop of hay might be raised. Meetings have been held to take these measures into consideration, and it was finally decided to fence the street leading to the pasture, and to put a gate there with a lock to it, that the practice of turning animals in there to graze might be stopped. Animals found there hereafter will be held liable for trespass, and if turned in by their owners, the latter will be prosecuted according to law. Another meeting of these land owners has been appointed for half-past seven on Saturday evening (July 9th), at the 14th Ward School House, at which time it is hoped, all will be present to take into consideration the time of cutting the hay, and also the making of arrangements for pasturing stock there after the hay shall be cut, and other business connected with the pasture.

**AN IMPROVEMENT.**—We noticed workmen engaged this morning in erecting a large awning in front of C. C. Asmussen's jewelry store on Main Street. The shade it will afford will be very agreeable for persons who have to pass up and down that side of the street much this hot weather.

**JOHN CHINAMAN.**—From the Ogden Junction, July 6, we learn that ten car loads of Chinamen arrived at Ogden yesterday morning from the West, and continued on eastward. They are to be employed on the Laramie division of the U. P. R. R. The railway companies generally, east and west, are looking with interest to the employment of the U. P. R. R. in the employment of Chinamen, if it proves a success, other companies will likely follow suit.

**POSTAL DELINQUENCY.**—W. H. Anderson, of Portage, Box Elder county, writing to the Editor of the NEWS, on the 1st inst., says:

"Yours of June 21st, mailed 22nd, came to hand the 30th, eight days coming, what ought to have been traveled in 12 hours. Received some letters in same package that were mailed on the 28th in Salt Lake City. Somebody is to blame. I have noticed other packages of papers for Malad City, Samaria, etc., go through the mails, and the Portage package be from one to four mails behind. Yesterday the Malad, Willow Springs and other packages went up, but no Portage package, and I know they were all mailed together."

Brother Anderson says the locusts and crickets are at work, and the prospect is that about two-thirds of a crop will be raised.

**ANTIDOTE FOR RATTLESNAKE BITE.**—W. H. Anderson, M. D., residing at Portage, Box Elder county, sends the following antidote for the poison of the rattlesnake, which he says he has seen tried hundreds of times, and never knew it fail:

The yellow of one egg,  
One table spoonful of salt,  
One table spoonful of gunpowder,  
Mix thoroughly and apply over the bite as a plaster. As long as poison remains in the wound the plaster will absorb it and fall off. Re-apply immediately until the plaster sticks, which is evidence that the poison has all been drawn, and keep the bowels open with a mild cathartic.

**BIRD'S EYE VIEW OF SALT LAKE CITY.**—Mr. Koch, the artist who was engaged a short time ago in taking a bird's eye view of this city, and which we described at the time as very fine, is in town, having arrived here a few days since. He expected to find his lithographed views here awaiting his arrival, but instead, he found a letter from his lithographers, informing him they would send them on the 10th inst. If no detention occurs, they will reach here by Saturday, and be ready for distribution to subscribers, at the farthest, by Monday, the 11th inst.

**SMITHFIELD.**—Brother Evan M. Green writing from Smithfield, July 2nd., gives us the following deplorable items:

"Last Tuesday, the memorable 27th, the grasshoppers commenced a raid on our fields and gardens; and our crops, that one week ago looked so fine and promising, are now nearly a desolation. If they should quit now, not more than one-third of a crop would be realized; but they are still here, though not so numerous as they were. They commenced alighting here on Tuesday, and our fields and gardens were literally alive with them by four o'clock p.m. They continued until Thursday, when about 11 o'clock a.m., they commenced to fly, and I think about two-thirds of them left. Should they continue a week as they are, all of our late crops will be a failure. Last Tuesday Sister Jacoba Bybee, wife of Bro. Robert L. Bybee, of this place, died. She is the eighth woman who has died and left a family of children in this place, since one year last April conference.
