Make Him Confess.

Modena, Utah, Nov. 24.-The grand jury of Lincoln county, Nevada, which convened at Pioche last Thursday, re-turned indictments yesterday against seventeen of the leading citizens of Fay, Nevada, who it is alleged, par-ticipated in the "stringing up" or George Ellis, colored, in an effort to make him confess to numerous thefts which had taken place in that vicinity

during the past few weeks. All of the men indicted are now in jai with the exception of Supt. Gayford of the Horseshoe Mining company, Postmaster Defreese and H. H. SHOT THE MAYOR.

M. Orsini, a Councilor of Roque brune, Commits the Deed.

Mentone, Nov. 24 .- At a meeting of the municipal council of Roquebrune last night M. Orsini one of the councilors, after a heated discussion, drew a revolver and shot M. Siguat, the deputy mayor, dangerously wounding also the mayor and the mayor's broth-er, who had tried to arrest Orsini. The latter escaped.

ADDITIONAL DETAILS.

New York, Nov. 25 .-- A dispatch to the Herald from Mentone gives the follow ing additional details concerning th shooting of several city officials by M. Orsini, one of the councilors.

The shooting occurred at the Roquebrune town council meeting. After vio lent discussion Orsini drew a revolver and fired at M. Brigliano, the mayor who was dangerously wounded in the abdomen. A second shot struck M Sigaut, the deputy mayor, who was mortally wounded and who died Sun-

The criminal was seized by a policeman but freed himself and sprang down the stairs, again firing his re-volver and slightly wounding another councilor. The crowd outside scattered and Orsini escaped. In the narrow streets of Roquebrune he met the brother of the mayor and fired once more. wounding him in the face. He got clear away and has probably crossed the Italian frontier. The picturesque old town is seeething

Paris Temps, Because of It, Makes Light of German Invasion of 1870. ent state of things.

New York, Nov. 25 .- The Paris correspondent of the London Times and New York Times quotes and contrasts two articles, in the Journal des Debats and the Temps respectively, on the subject of the German attacks on Mr. Chamberlain for his Edinburgh

speech. The article in the Journal des Debats is calm and moderate. It traces in the attacks profound hostility to Great Britain on the part of the Germans and concludes that the Boer war is only the occasion, not the cause for the display of anglophobia which existed before the outbreak.

The Temps on the other hand is so devoted to the Boer cause that, in attacking Great Britain it minimizes, while not excusing, the German proceedings in the invasion of 1870. It adds that when Mr. Chamberlain compares the conduct of the British troops in the South African war with the acts of the soldiers of any other nation, he insults the whole people.
