convention was passed, and the

convention adjourned sine die.

New York, 3.—On the reception of

the news of Greeley's nomination, a

large crowd gathered at the Tribune

office, and Greeley was called out, but

declined to speak. A salute of 100 guns

fired in the city hall park in his

honor. The Tribune says he will take

a large portion of the Republican party

with him, and the Democrats will en-

dorse him. The Commercial Advertiser

says the prospects of the Republican

party are bright, and whether the Dem-

ocrats endorse Greeley or not, he is

doomed to defeat. The Evening Post

heads the news, "and failure," "Re-

form surrenders to monopoly and cen-

tralization." Greeley expressed sur-

prise at the nomination and said he

would accept in a letter. The nomi-

nation elicited various opinions, some

declaring the convention a fiasco; others

claiming that Greeley has a strong hold

on the masses and his views on general

annuity will give him great strength

in the South. The Liberal communi-

ties were deluged to night. Next week

the ratification meeting will be held.

The weather has been remarkably

favorable, although unusually cool,

during the last week, so that the
