

WORLD'S DOINGS TOLD IN BRIEF.

Country About Monastir Has Been Absolutely Devastated By Turks.

RELIEF FOR FLOOD IN AUSTRIA.

Discovery of a Castle in Germany Supposed to Have Been Built In 900 B. C.

London, Sept. 12.—The Salonica correspondent of the Times, after visiting Monastir, sends a detailed history of the massacre and the Turkish operations for its suppression. He says: "No details have yet been received as to the result of more remote military drives, but from information emanating from trustworthy sources not usually unfriendly to the Turks there is reason to fear that the country has been absolutely devastated and all the Christians of both sexes and all ages, who have failed to find refuge in the woods have been put to the sword."

Vienna.—An imperial rescript is published authorizing an appropriation of 1,000,000 kronen for the relief of the flooded districts and the repair of the state property damaged by floods in Bohemia, Silesia and Galicia.

Berlin.—A castle, which is believed to have existed 400 years before Christ, has been brought to light near Cassel.

London.—The Brussels correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says that negotiations between representatives of the large steel works in Germany, Belgium and France for the formation of a European steel trust are progressing favorably.

Berlin.—Four students of the technical high school at Stuttgart have been sentenced to three months' detention in a fortress for dueling.

Rome.—Dr. Farri, the Socialist leader, has been sentenced to the movement against the announced intention of the Socialists to visit the czar in his approaching visit to Rome, publishes in the Avanti a vehement attack on Russian absolutism.

Guthrie, O. T.—By a decision of the supreme court the decision of the district court of Noble county, in the case of Asa C. Sharpe, formerly Poncha Indian agent, has been affirmed. Sharpe was convicted of demanding a bribe while agent for the Ponchas.

Berlin.—The keeper of the restaurant attached to the royal opera house at Dresden, which he has occupied for 15 years, has been refused a renewal of his lease because he sold chocolate bearing pictures of ex-Crown Princess Louise of Saxony (who eloped with the French tutor Giron), and her children.

Chicago.—The Record Herald today says: The National Woman's Christian Temperance union has begun a campaign for the expulsion of Senator Reed Smoot of Utah from the United States senate.

Philadelphia.—No more cents are to be made by the United States mint here for at least a year, unless a special order is issued from the United States treasury at Washington.

London.—A dispatch from Liverpool to the Times says it is reported that the White Star, Dominion, and American steamship lines will shortly cease to exist as distinct organizations, the Dominion and American lines being taken over by the White Star.

New York.—Sir Thomas Lipton, accompanied by the Earl and Countess of Shaftesbury and a party of friends, left here last night on a special car for Timothy L. Woodruff's camp in the Adirondacks.

Toronto.—Judge Winchester has fixed the date for hearing the motion for extradition in the case against Leopold J. Stori of Baltimore, indicted in Washington for alleged postal frauds, for Saturday, Sept. 19.

Chicago.—In the presence of her blind mother, Clara Costello last night has married a man who has been a match to her. She was so badly burned that she died a short time later in the hospital. Her mother made desperate efforts to save the woman, but because of her blindness was not able to accomplish anything.

Winnipeg, Man.—Hugh Mann, brother of D.D. Mann, vice president of the Canadian Northern railroad and himself a prominent inventor and railroad builder, has been accidentally killed near Brown's mill, W. T. while superintending track laying operations.

New York.—Clifford C. Pearson, paymaster at the Boston navyyard for 38 years, is dead at his home in Plainfield, N. J., from paralysis.

Mobile, Ala.—The Norwegian steamer Condor has sailed with supplies for the storm sufferers of Grand Cayman.

Saratoga, N. Y.—A reception to Admiral Dewey at the Saratoga club last night was one of the most brilliant events of the season, distinguished men from all parts of the country assisting the citizens' committee in doing honor to the admiral.

Genoa.—Although no official instructions have yet been received from the government regarding the supposed outbreak of bubonic plague at Marselles, the local authorities have given orders that ships arriving from Marselles shall be inspected and disinfected before being allowed to enter the harbor.

Ottawa, Ont.—Word has been received by the department of the interior from Dr. Robert Bell of the geological survey, that the international geological congress held at Vienna, has decided to hold its next triennial congress in Mexico.

Worcester, Mass.—Theresa Vaughan, formerly a well known comic opera singer, who has been an inmate of the Worcester insane asylum for several years, is reported to be much worse and the members of her family have been notified that her death may be expected shortly.

New York.—Twenty-eight tobacco shops in this city owned by the Independent cigar stores company, are reported to have been purchased by the United Cigar stores company and the strife between the two combinations is at an end.

New York.—A call has been issued to American negroes for a convention to be held in Brooklyn on Oct. 11 and 12 "for the purpose of organizing a permanent national organization which will provide for the uplifting of the negro race along all lines."

TREACHERY OF OLD NEPTUNE.

Story of a Sea Tragedy in the Waters of the West Indies.

A SCHOONER "TURNED TURTLE"

Crew of Seventeen Thrown Into the Ocean—Seven Men and a Woman Saved.

Providence, R. I., Sept. 12.—The details of a sea tragedy in the West Indian waters have been reported by the schooner W. S. Fielding which has just returned to this port. Nearing Port au Prince on her outward voyage the Fielding ran near a dark object which was found to be an overturned boat with seven men and one woman clinging to it striving to hold on to the slippery bottom.

The coasting schooner, name unknown, to which they belonged, had struck a rock, and partly filled and then suddenly "turned turtle." The crew of seventeen persons had all managed to get upon the bottom of the craft.

Days of starvation and thirst ensued, during which nine of the seventeen died. On the fifth day came the rescue of the eight survivors.

The Fielding was about 12 miles from the island of Gonaves when the wreck was sighted. The official expression of hearty thanks of the Haytian government.
