Attorney-General Douglas Appeals to Congress In Northern Securities Case.

An Amendment to Judiciary Act Wanted That Will Change State's Anamolous Position.

Minneapolis, Minn., March 7 .- Atty-Gen. Douglas has appealed to Congress in the Northern Securities case With the backing of the Minnesota legislature and the Minnesota delegation in both branches at Washington, he hopes for an amendment to the judiciary act which wil change the anomalous position in which Minnesota is now placed.

The decision in the Northern Securitles case shuis out the state completely from redress in the federal courts. The court lays down the rule that a state cannot sue a citizen of another state where citizens of the plaintiff state are necessary parties. This chass of cases s absolutely barred from the federa courts. In the belief of most of the attorneys, the Northern Securities company cannot be reached in the state ourts of Minnesota.
