NEWS ITEMS.

TWENTY-FOUR thousand gallons white wine and twelve thousand gallons brandy have been already shipped this season for the East by the Buena Vista Vinicultural Society of Sonoma, Cal.

AN artesian well in Dalton, Massachusetts, discharges 450 gallons per minute, or 648,000 gallons a day, and the water was obtained at the depth of only 76 feet. This leads every other artesian well in the world, the nearest approach being one in Chicago, which discharges 576,000 gallons a day.

A SHORT time since the long talked of experiment of exploding a submarine torpedo in an oil well to enlarge its producing capacity was tried in the "Ladies Well," on the Watson Flats, just below Titusville. The torpedo contained eight pounds of powder, and was applied at a depth of 463 feet. The explosion caused the oil and water to spout out of the well some thirty feet into the air. The flow of oil, water and paraffine continued for some ten minutes, when the disturbance subsided gradually, and oil appeared on the surface as fast as it could be dipped out with a hand-pump.

HURRICANE AT LISBON.—Jan. 13th, at about 6 a. m., a hurricane burst with fury over Lisbon. In a very short space of time great damage was done, principally to the shipping. Several ships have been sunk in the river or damaged considerably, among which may be mentioned the Portuguese brig Feliz-Es-folda, and the brig Lusitono. The French brig Boiteldeau, from Rouen, has been sunk. The vessels of war in harbor did not suffer damage, but all the steam vessels kept up steam throughout the day. The lighters, of which a large number are employed in the harbor in the discharge of vessels, suffered very much. It is said as many as forty-two have sunk. The chief loss occurred at the Custom house quay, where several lighters, with valuable cargoes from vessels in the harbor, were waiting to be discharged, all of which were almost instantaneously capsized by the violence of the wind. In the Alcantra Gardens, and other exposed places, large trees were blown down, and in Lisbon generally and the suburbs, much damage has been done.

SOME curious facts have been disclosed by statistics furnished by the Sanitary Commission, which body has caused measurements to be made on an extensive scale in our armies, and among rebel prisoners. It appears that southern soldiers average one inch more in stature than northern troops, but one less in girth, and in cranial measurement. Five per cent. of the rebel prisoners were of foreign birth, and twenty per cent. of Union soldiers were foreigners.

IN one of the processes of steel pen making, done by females at Birmingham, a quick worker will cut out in one day, of ten working hours, 250 gross, or 36,000 pens, which involves 72,000 distinct motions of the arm—2 in every second.

IT was lately stated at a Bible association anniversary in London, that a calculation had been made respecting the proportionate value of the services of gentlemen and ladies as collectors for charitable and religious purposes, and it was found that one lady was worth thirteen gentlemen and a half.

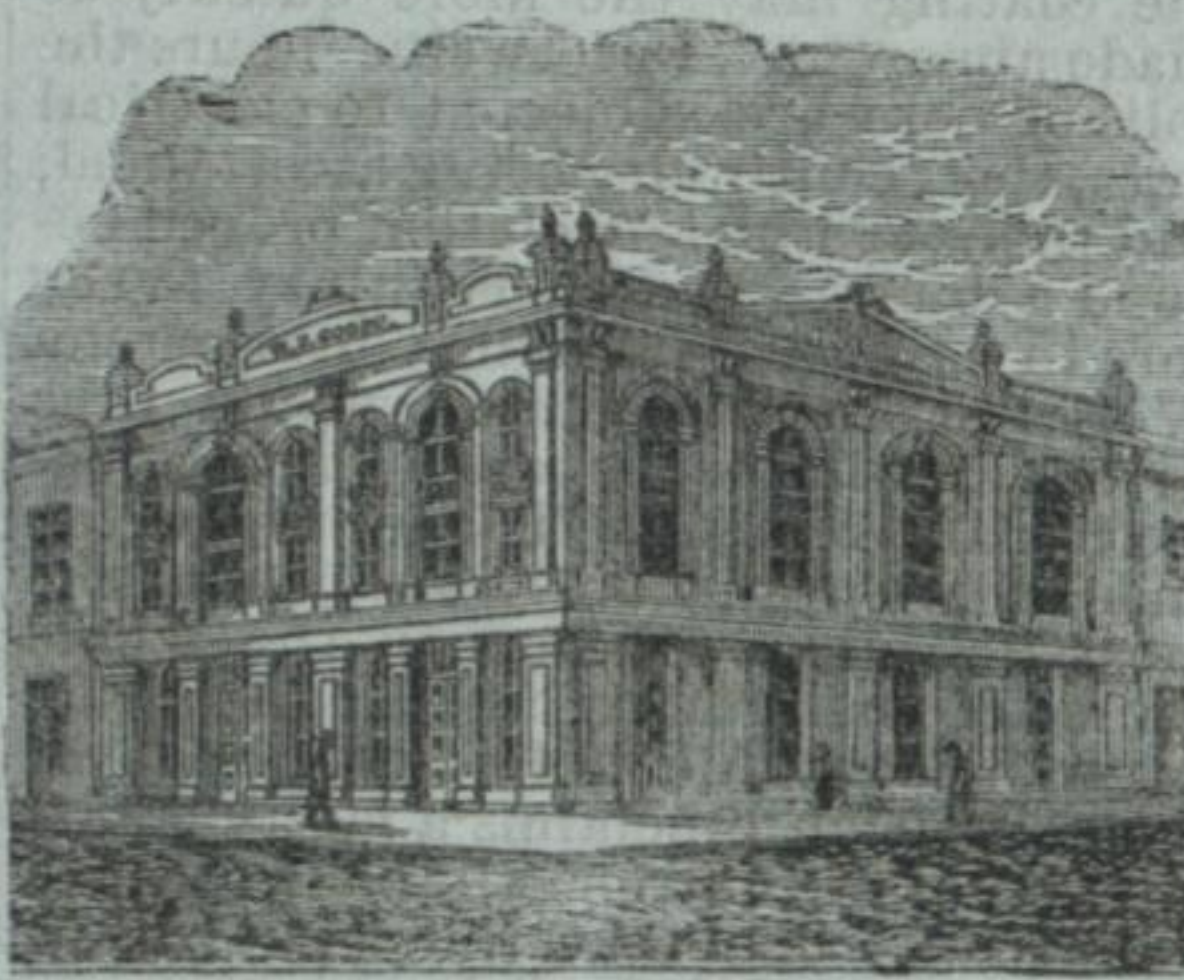
