NEW YORK, 28 .- Lawrence Donovan, printer, employed on a weekly paper, jumped from the Brooklyn Bridge for a wager of \$500, at 5:30 o'clock this morning. A boat was in the river containing some friends who picked him up.

He was not injured by the jump.

Laurence Donovan, the hero of the

Laurence Donovan, the hero of the latest jump, is a pressman. Wm.Reid, foreman of the pressroom, says: Donovan's plan to jump from the bridge was definitely formed two weeks ago, during a dispute in the office one night about the chances of escaping from it alive. Donovan finally said he was not alraid to try the jump that killed Odium, so a bet of \$500 was arranged with foreman Reid. Preparations were made at once and last night all was ready. Everybody in the Poall was ready. Everybody in the Po-lice Gazette building knew about it and was anxious to witness the jump. Donovan didn't work last night. He slept in the building, however, and was aroused at 4.30 as the night shift went off. He was immediately dressed for the lamp. for the jump.
