LOCAL BRIEFS.

Leaves Ely for Salt Lake.—F. G. Morse of Ely has removed to this city to engage in business.

Teachers File Acceptances.—Yesterday was the last day for acceptance of contracts for teaching in the schools of Salt Lake City next year, and only about 2 per cent of the 420 teachers employed in the city schools did not sign contracts for the coming year's work.

Select Palmer Assistant.—B. C. Palmer, a school teacher of Taylorsville, has been appointed assistant superintendent of the Utah detention home, by the county commissioners, at a salary of \$60 per month. Mr. Palmer will live at the school and will instruct the boys retained at the home.

SEWER CONTRACT IS NOT APPROVED

Davis & Heuser Said to Have Used Defective Pipe in Former Job.

ASK RELIEF FROM FLOODS

Residents of West North Temple Street Again Petition Council to Act—Many Claims.

Bids for the construction of sewer extension No. 182, including all the streets between A street and the military reservation on the west and from Third to Sixth avenues, will be advertised for again, as the city council last night refused to confirm the award of the contract for doing the work to the firm of Davis & Heuser.

At the meeting a week ago the matter came up and Councilman Fernstrom asked that the matter of approving the contract go over another week, as he wished to investigate charges of drunkenness and incompetency charged against the firm whom the contract had been awarded by the board of public works. Among these charges, which had been made before the committee was one that C. U. Heuser of the firm was working on extension No. 178, took the inspector on the job over to the pipe factory and had him approve of some defective pipe while in an intoxicated condition. Mr. Fernstrom said it looked like the firm wanted to "job" the city and that the firm was not reliable.

Councilman Black was in favor of re-advancing the bids, as he said the work could be done more cheaply now than when the bids were prepared on which the contract was let, and he was of the opinion that the city would save between \$5,000 and \$10,000 by re-advancing.

Councilman Hall was in favor of awarding the contract, saying that it was entered into in good faith by Davis & Heuser, who were the lowest bidders. Councilman Perry also defended the contractors saying that the charges against the firm had not been substantiated.

ENGINEER REPORTS.
Engineer Kelsey was called upon for a statement on the defective inspection incident. Mr. Kelsey said that the inspector on that piece of work passed pipe, while according to the rules all inspection must take place at the works, and not at the factory. Mr. Kelsey, assistant to Mr. Kelsey, had reported that the pipe was in bad condition and not fit to go into the sewer. The board of public works was then notified, the defective pipe was discharged.

When it came to a vote, the matter of approving the contract was a tie, 6 to 6. Readall immediately appealed from the ruling of the chair, but President Davis would not entertain the appeal, and Councilman Readall subsided. Mayor Brandegee informed the council that he wished to visit his old home in California. President Davis of the council was appointed mayor pro tem.

ROUTINE MATTERS.
The finance committee recommended that bids be re-advertised for the grading of Third South, between Eleventh and Twelfth East streets. Mr. Holly introduced a resolution providing that the city engineer be instructed to replace the headgate at Fourth West and North Temple streets removed by the Oregon Short line, and that the water will flow into the gravity sewer. Adopted.

A communication was received from City Engineer Kelsey, asking authority to employ a competent chemist and that the city put in a testing laboratory for testing asphalt used in street pavement. The matter was referred to the committee on streets.

Several claims for damages alleged to have been done to property owners through the changing of grades in streets and sidewalks were presented last night.

P. H. Robinson wanted \$475 for damages to his property in Donelson's court by reason of the overflow of water from Fifth East street, and heavy rains. L. B. Wright asked for \$300 damage done his property on Windsor avenue by the change of grade. Edna Houtz asked for \$5000 damages for injuries sustained by her buggy running into an open ditch at Fifth East and Fifth South.

Acting Chief of Police Hempel was authorized to employ 10 special police officers during the city convention in this city at \$3 per shift for four shifts.

A request of City Engineer Kelsey that he be permitted to oil the macadam streets in the city was referred to the finance and street committee.

The Utah Light & Railway company asked permission to construct sewers, manholes, traps, etc., and to connect with the sewer on the west side of east Sixth South street, and also in block 25, plat B; referred to engineering committee.

ASK RELIEF FROM FLOOD.

A petition was received from E. E. Rich and many others asking that the council take some steps to prevent the annual recurrence of floods by the overflow of City creek, west of Sixth West street on North Temple. Petitioners complain that the material of which the embankment along the creek is inferior, being defective, and ask that the council take steps at once to place their property out of danger from the high waters. The petition was referred to the committee on streets.

The bond issue was not mentioned during the whole evening. However, Mr. Black moved after the passage of the list of expenditures the council take a recess until Thursday evening. The bond ordinance "may" come up then.
