LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

QUARTERLY CONFERENCE.

A quarterly conference of the Salt Lake Stake of Zion will be held, in the large Tabernacle, in this city, on Saturday and Sunday, the 6th and 7th of July, beginning at 10 a.m., on the 6th. A general attendance of the saints of this Stake is requested.

The Number.—We understand the company of Saints expected to sail from Liverpool next Saturday, will number in the vicinity of 650 persons.

Passed.—A private dispatch was received last night, stating that Mr. Richard W. Young, son of the late Jos. W. Young, Esq., had passed his examination at West Point, as military cadet from Utah.

For the Coast.—The San Francisco excursion party, numbering just about 100 persons, left the city yesterday afternoon. A few citizens of Ogden intended joining the company there.

From Provo.—This morning we were pleased to receive a call from our esteemed friend Prof. Karl G. Mauser, who is up from Provo, the Brigham Young Academy, of which he is Principal, having closed for the summer vacation.

Brick.—A most excellent material for making brick having been found immediately adjacent to Fountain Green, Sanpete, that article is being quite extensively manufactured there, and new houses of that material are going up in various parts of the thrifty town.

Railroad Project.—It is pretty certain that the building of a railroad between the terminus of the Utah Southern and the Price Mining District will be commenced next year. The projectors of the enterprise are not decided as to whether it shall be broad or narrow gauge.

Coming Emigrants.—A telegram was received this morning, from Elder William C. Staines, stating that the company of Saints that left Liverpool on the 15th inst., had arrived at New York, and would leave for Utah to-night. The party numbers about 250, and the returning missionaries are with it: Theodore Brandley, Reinhard Mauser, Richard Steels, Samuel Claridge.

Accident.—Brother Saml. House, who is in from Grantsville, informs us of a severe accident that befel his son-in-law, Claus Anderson, on Friday, the 15th inst., at that place. The young man was on horseback, driving cattle, when the animal slipped and fell upon its rider, breaking the small bone of the leg, near the ankle. Dr. Dodd, of Tooele, was summoned to attend the case, but refused to respond to the call unless his fee, \$30, was guaranteed in advance. The patient was brought to this city and received the necessary aid from Dr. Benedict, and is now doing well and about to return home.

The Arctic Regions.—Captain Tuttle, an old arctic voyager, who has had many thrilling adventures and remarkable experiences among the icebergs and bears of the frozen regions, is still in this city and has been requested to repeat the lecture he delivered on Sunday evening last, and which was listened to with great interest.

To-morrow, Thursday, evening, he will relate the story of his travels, at the Fourteenth Ward Assembly room, admission twenty-five cents. Capt. Tuttle has traveled nearly all over the world and has penetrated as far northward as any man living. He has looked upon the open polar sea, and found deposits of the precious metals in the cliffs, washed by its waters. He has many novel experiences to describe, and all who attend will be well repaid for their time and the small cost of admission. The lecture will commence at 8 o'clock, sharp.

The Unfortunate Peddler.—A short time since a brief article appeared in the NEWS, in which it was stated that a respectable resident of this city had, on account of ill-health, taken to peddling a few fancy articles, made by himself and family, as a means of making a living. We mentioned the fact also that he had been stopped dispoing of his wares in the small way by an officer of a city in Tooele County, on the ground that an ordinance that place required that he should obtain a license. Now comes Robert Orr, Jr., policeman on duty, of Grantsville, and says, in a letter, about the peddler:

"If he will prove to the officer that he and his family manufacture jewelry, combs, needles and other goods, said officer will give the aged peddler a free license to peddle in the unnamed city. If peddlers think they can run their business on a bluff, or in defiance of city ordinances and misrepresentation, under the plea of age—too thin."

Even admitting that the peddler should have sold a fine tooth comb or two or a few papers of needles, in addition to the articles of his own make, we think the majesty of the law wouldn't have been so very ruthlessly trodden under foot, under the circumstances.

City Council.—The Council met last evening, Mayor Little presiding. **Petition of William Paul, son,** asking that he be appointed inspector of public buildings. Referred to the committee on public works. **Petition of Philip Pugsley and others,** calling attention to the canal on Seventh West Street, and suggesting that it be cleaned out and widened: Referred to the committee on improvements.

The committee on finance, to whom was referred the report of the auditor for the quarter ending May last, reported that they had found the report correct and recommended that it be accepted and adopted. Report adopted.

The chief engineer of the fire department reported that, in accordance with the order of the Council, the steam fire engine had been repaired, and that the sum of \$416.47 was due to the Utah Central Railroad machine shops therefor. The report was received and the amount appropriated.

The water was all claimed and used, and that he had no authority to permit them to take water away from the lawful owners thereof.

On motion, the subject of carrying fresh water to the Warm Springs bath house, was referred to the committee on water works. The ordinance relating to the city section and cemetery was taken up and passed its first reading. Pending its second reading the Council adjourned till next Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock.

Pictorial Preaching.—This morning we were shown, by Brother C. G. A. Christensen, of Ephraim, a series of pictures, in oil colors, illustrating religious subjects. The representations are upon a continuous scroll, attached to rollers, so as to be unrolled and one painting exhibited at a time.

The work was ordered by Elder D. B. Huntington, and its object is, in missionary labor among the Lamanites, or Indians, to convey a clear and ready conception to their minds of leading events of sacred history and the principles connected therewith. This method of preaching to the Indians, imparting to them a knowledge of the gospel as it existed among their fathers, by means of object lessons, is a good one. The pictures represent, respectively, Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, partaking of the fruit of the Tree of Life; the murder of Abel by his brother, Cain; the flood, with a representation of the Ark; Lehi and his family leaving Jerusalem to take their journey to the American continent; Nephi bound by his brethren, on board the vessel; the landing of the colonists, the forefathers of the Indians, upon the shores of the American continent; the baptism of Christ in the river Jordan, by John the Baptist; Crucifixion of the Savior; Christ appearing to the ancient inhabitants of this continent, after his crucifixion and resurrection; Moroni hiding up the plates containing the records of the Book of Mormon, &c.; Joseph Smith, the Prophet, receiving the plates of the Book of Mormon from the hands of the Angel, Moroni.

News From Kanab.—By courtesy of President John Taylor we have perused a letter to him from President L. John Nuttall, of Kanab Stake, dated at Kanab settlement, June 15th. He states that the people generally are feeling well. Many improvements are being made. About 1,700 rods of good fence, enclosing about 1,100 acres of land, has been completed at Kanab; also between three and four miles of water ditch. In addition, most of the best hay land in Kanab Cañon has been fenced. A number of brethren are laying rock in some of the water sects of the settlement, to prevent washing out of the streets and sidewalks. Grain crops never looked better than now, but the fruit crop is all gone, by frost, excepting grapes, of which there will be an abundant yield. Lately the thermometer has been at from 55 to 90 degrees.

The death of Elder Levi Stewart, heretofore mentioned in the NEWS, occurred about 25 miles from Kanab, while he was on his way to this city. He had been troubled for some time with an affection of the lungs and a rash of blood to the head. The attack which carried him off was quite sudden, causing him to expire within 15 minutes after being taken ill. He died without apparent pain or distress.

Not on Sunday.—Brother Matthew Caldwell, of Fountain Green, called this morning and stated positively that the catastrophe that occurred on Funch's Lake, last Sunday, by which 11 young people lost their lives, did not take place on Sunday, but on Saturday last. The dispatch giving a narration of the sad event was dated June 24th, and spoke of the calamity as having occurred "yesterday," which was evidently an error, inadvertently made. The remains of the victims of the accident were interred on Monday, at Ephraim.

Chapter IV.—Youthful Skepticism—Suggestions to Young Men—An Easy Way to Investigate.

Youthful skepticism are said to be numerous. Now this may or may not be the case, but there are doubtless some instances where young men have little or no faith in God; but on what ground is their skepticism based? When one of this class is questioned as to the prophecies contained in the scriptures, and the histories that record their fulfillment, he is found to be entirely at a loss. Although he may appear fairly posted in some other matters, if you ask him about Herodotus, or Tertullian, or Tacitus, and their writings, touch upon the Commentaries on the Bible? Has he ever read fifteen leading chapters in the Bible itself? Has he even read the Book of Daniel? and you confuse him as badly as though you suddenly called on him to preach or pray. One reason of this is because, with the exception of the Bible, most of the works mentioned are scarce, and some are very difficult to obtain. Book-sellers do not have them for sale, unless specially ordered. But the main reason is, that the inclination of the youth in question has been to avoid religious thoughts and Biblical literature. He has probably read some scientific works, into whose pages the witty authors have doubtless insinuated here and there infidel arguments and reasonings. Many of these works are produced by infidels and spiritualists, who love to saddle the back of science with all their absurdities, and thus bring their sophistry into notice, disguised beneath the cloak of scientific inquiry. He has probably read some of the latest works of the student, and he sinks into the dark valley of unbelief, before he has had the opportunity to glean from the rich fields of knowledge, scarcely any of the glorious truths concerning God and his works.

To such a young man, I would suggest, as a remedy, that you peruse the sacred infidelity to encircle you in his silly coils, do yourself the justice to read even one book of glorious prophecy! Read simply the Book of Daniel, read it carefully. Then take one of Lyman's Historical Charts (for he here) and compare the prophecies recorded by David 500 years before Christ. Compare these visions, interpretations and prophecies with the rise and fall of governments, empires and kingdoms as shown in the chart, and unless your reason is calloused you will be filled with admiration. There can be no deception in this; in the one book you will find the prophecies, and in the other is the record of their fulfillment which has occupied a period of over 2,400 years. As a still further aid read the first volume of Rollin's Ancient History (for sale here) and not only will your reason be convinced, but your heart will be touched with the manner of God's dealings among the children of men.

While a portion of the book of Daniel as well as other books in the scriptures, is of an historical character, and as such is simply a truthful record of past events, no one can read, hence infidels have literally come to pass, and the truth is more apparent to us in the case of the revelations to Daniel. Because of their specific plainness and continued and current fulfillment. We are amazed at what has already taken place, and we can easily foresee that the early future will develop the remainder of the grand programme, involving the sacrifice of all wicked nations and the establishment of Christ's dominion.

We must remember that it is far easier to ridicule sacred things than to obey them, hence infidels have the advantage. They find a ready response to their theories, and it would be indeed strange if they did not extend their numbers rapidly among the ignorant and unthinking, who, as a general thing, prefer pleasure and a reckless life, to the more arduous pursuit of virtue and lasting happiness. We must also remember that truths of every kind have always had to run the gauntlet of ridicule and persecution. The greatest principles of wisdom known to man to-day, are among the number that were once treated with ridicule. So let no one prejudge as a fool, but rather investigate as a philosopher.
