How to Get Rid of Warts .- The following is said to be a certain remedy for warts and corns: Take a small piece of potash and let it stand in the open air until it slacks; thicken it to a paste with pulverized gum arabic, which prevents it from spreading where it is not wanted Pare off the seeds of the wart or the dead skin of the corn, apply the paste and let it remain ten minutes; wash off and soak the place in sharp vinegar or sweet oil, which will neutralize the alkali; after which leave them entirely alone and nature will remove them. Warts may often be cured by rubbing them daily with a radish, or with Juice of marigold flowers, beans or milk-


