**CONGRESSIONAL.**

**SENATE.**

WASHINGTON, 17.—On motion of Frelinghuysen the bill repealing the act for the relief of certain Indians in the Sioux superintendency, known as Teton Sioux.  
Morton called up his resolution, instructing the committee on elections to inquire into the defects of the present electoral system and the best means for remedying them.  
He made a lengthy and elaborate argument against the present system of Presidential elections. He reviewed the constitutional position of the States on the matter. Under the present system, the matter was placed entirely beyond the jurisdiction of the national government and entirely without remedy or redress on its part. Whatever disorders, irregularities, or failures may occur in the appointment of electors in any State, no provision is anywhere made for contesting elections or electors, and whatsoever returns shall be made up, although produced wholly or in part by fraud or violence, stand, and are counted upon them, if returned in time. He argued that there was imminent danger of revolution whenever the result of the Presidential election is to be determined by the vote of a State in which the election of electors has been irregular, or is alleged to have been carried by fraud and violence. There ought to be such machinery of government provided, that it would be impossible that any man should ever reach the Presidential chair who is not legitimately chosen. He made an elaborate argument in favor of the plan of direct vote of the people for President and vice-President, and in preference that the President should be elected by the people as one community, giving the election to the man who received the highest number of votes, without restriction of State lines or municipal divisions, so that a national character might exist in one department of the government. He proposed that each State be divided into as many districts as electors, and Representatives, each district to have one vote in the election of President and vice-President, the vote of that district to be counted in favor of the candidate who received the largest number of votes in it. This would still give each State the same number of votes it now has in the election of President and vice-President, but would, however, be to be given directly by the candidates by the people without the intervention of electors. He argued the fairness of this arrangement, to which he favored the addition of a provision which would refer all disputes which might arise in districts or States to the U. S. courts.

ALBANY, N. Y., 17.—In Constitutional Convention to-day O'Byrne offered an amendment to the Constitution providing for compulsory education.  
WASHINGTON, 17.—"By the President of the United States. Executive order.  
Whereas it has been brought to the notice of the President of the United States that many persons holding civil office by appointment from him or otherwise under the Constitutional laws of the United States, while holding federal positions, accept of grossly inadequate salaries, and in some instances in which they receive, or of municipal corporation under charters and ordinance of such corporations, thereby receiving the duties of State, Territorial, or municipal offices at the same time that they are charged with the duties of civil office held under federal authority; and whereas it is believed, with few exceptions, the holding of two such offices by the same person is incompatible with the due and faithful discharge of the duties of either office, that it frequently gives rise to gross inconvenience and often results in detriment to the public service, and inasmuch as it is not in harmony with the genius of the Government in the premises, therefore the President has deemed it proper to issue this order, to give public notice that from and after the fourth day of March, 1873, except as herein specified, persons holding any federal civil office by appointment under the Constitution and laws of the United States, will be expected, while holding such
