IN FAVOR OF THE BILL.

LIBERAL FEDERATION CONGRESS

Three Thousand Delegates Meet in
Hundreds Spoke.

New Castle, Oct. 1.—(Continued.)—by N. Y. Associated Press.—The formal opening of the great National Liberal Federation Congress was held yesterday. The most important preparations were made for the reception and entertainment of Gladstone, who will arrive tonight. An enormous crowd of delegates from all parts of the country was called to enter at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Dr. Watson, who presided, was received resoundingly.

Opposition of the size of the congress can be gauged from the fact that no less than 110 delegations, to say nothing of the distinguished parliamentary leaders, have made arrangements to attend, and that 1,000 labor leaders are to be present.

As each of the 500 delegations represented a thousand or more supporters, it is estimated there will be 500,000 persons from England and Wales alone.

Meeting in the great meeting-room, adjured in the spirit of liberalism as inspired by the highest motives and the noblest impulses. Indeed, he said, had vindicated the confidence. The Liberals had failed in their effort to recruit the party, but the cause of progress could not indefinitely wait.

In regard to Home Rule, he said that it was the Liberals' fault, for they had not been able to get the Conservative leaders to accept it in any way. There was a prospect that if victory, the members of the House of Commons would fail to all save members of the Conservative party, and that those who did not support it would not enthusiastically work with it.

Condition after condition, Murry said he was ready to begin the agitation against the Tory party. Pessimism, he said, was the only thing holding him back.

After a few words on the exercise of the franchise, he said, he did not know how the value of the workmen could be heard with all the enthusiasm which the Conservatives possessed.

The general feeling was that the example of other countries in having a constitution and by placing some moderate concessions with the reach of one's neighbors serve the people in England and Ireland.
