Religious Services.—Religious services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at the Tabernacle, to-morrow afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock.

Immigrants.—By telegram from W. H. Barnett, San Francisco, to President John Taylor, dated last night, we learn that a company of forty-eight immigrants from the Australian Mission, left that point for Ogden yesterday evening.

Taste and Enterprise.—The Dramatic Festival begun at Cincinnati on Monday night honors the taste and enterprise of that city, which nobly sustains with rare public spirit the only grand encouragement of the arts in this country. The play "Julius Caesar," with which the festival was opened, alone cost \$27,000 for properties, while on the simple stage appear 500 performers, as Roman citizens and soldiers, and the costumes are daily drilled for the last two weeks. McCullough, Barrett, Murdoch, Louis James and Miss Forsyth appeared in this same performance. These particulars afford an idea of the untold liberality and minute painstaking which have characterized the festival. One of the smokiest, dirtiest, hottest cities on the continent, Cincinnati shines pre eminent for its devotion to artistic culture. It is a triumph of mind over matter; a conquest of the body by the spirit.—Detroit Free Press.

The Thomas Musical Festival is on a par with the Dramatic Festival given at Cincinnati, and on the same ground, the fact that the great musician will appear here does honor to the taste and enterprise of Salt Lake.

Death of James W. Cummings.—The hosts of friends of Elder Jas. W. Cummings, of the Fourteenth Ward, will be surprised and pained to learn of his death, which occurred ten minutes to three o'clock this morning. The cause of his demise was heart disease, accompanied by complications.

Brother Cummings was 63 years old on the 10th of last March, a native of the State of Maine, and a lineal descendant from the Pilgrim Fathers. He had been connected with the Church over forty years, was full of zeal and integrity for the work, and greatly respected by the community, among whom he has many warm friends.

The funeral services will be conducted at the Fourteenth Ward Assembly Rooms at 1 o'clock p.m. to-morrow. Friends of the family are invited.

Case of Suicide.—On Thursday last, at North Jordan, a woman named Butterfield, aged about 40 years, wife of Jacob Butterfield, committed suicide by jumping down a well. It appears that the deceased had been demented for some time, and once before made an attempt upon her life. She had also made an attempt to throw a child down the well in which she herself was drowned.

The well is only about 14 inches wide, and the deceased gathered her clothes about her and jumped in feet first, with her hands raised over her head. When taken out she was quite dead. An inquest was held over the remains by Justice Webster and a verdict given in accordance with the facts. The funeral took place yesterday.

Janaschek.—Madam Janaschek treated an immense audience last evening at the Opera House to another exhibition of her marvelous powers as a delineator of human passion and intense emotion. The Jewish mother, robbed of her infant child, then searching for her offspring through the world under the guise of Rudiga the Sorceress, but to find her darling, grown to womanhood, firmly attached to the scenes and persons of her childhood, was impersonated in a thrilling manner and with a fidelity to nature only possible in a thorough artist.

It was another triumph for the great actress that has held immense audiences spell-bound every night this week. The support was excellent in every respect. To-night "Maebeth" will close the most brilliant engagement ever had in the Opera House.

Changed his Appearance.—This afternoon we were accosted by a gentleman on the street, and had it not been for his familiar voice we should not have recognized him as Brother George Calder. The reason for this was that he is just convalescent from an attack of rheumatic fever, which lasted fourteen weeks. In addition to the attenuation of his physique by protracted illness, he has allowed his beard to grow, his appearance being remarkably changed. He was amusing himself to-day, accosting his old friends and acquaintances and enjoying their efforts at recognition. Brother George has still a goodly frame left, and will probably soon obtain another coating, to replace the reductions made by recent illness, and will get ready at the gardens for the "pleasuring" season, which has about set in.

Alleged Robbery.—Yesterday, William Murphy, who had been working for the I. & R. G. was around filling himself up with beer in the evening, after dark, he wandered to the vicinity of the railroad depot, and claims that it was there that he was set upon by a couple of men, by whom he was knocked down and robbed. Last night he said the amount taken from him was \$275, an hour or two later he reduced the sum to \$250, and this morning, in answer to direct questions put to him, he made a still more sweeping reduction, getting it down to \$18. Perhaps by to-morrow there may be a further decline until the sum reaches the nominal figure of fifteen or twenty cents.

Toes Amputated.—Our readers will probably remember an account given in the News of Bishop Jasper Robertson and two other brethren being caught in a terrible storm in the mountains while on their way to Orangeville, Emery County, from this city, shortly after Conference. He came to town a few days ago for treatment at the Deseret hospital. To-day several of his toes were amputated, the operation being performed by Doctors Anderson and Hughes.

This man ought to be looked after and taken care of before he does anybody any serious hurt.

A Good Road Maker.—The road maker imported by the Driving Park Association through H. B. Clawson, mentioned in last evening's issue, was tried yesterday afternoon on the drive inside of Liberty Park. It worked to a charm, making the ground level smooth and solid. For that kind of work it is an excellent implement. It does the work of a whole squad of men and in much less time. The D. P. A. are entitled to credit for their enterprise in having it brought along.

In the first place the machine is worthless in heavy grass, and thus the company deal with their customers. They will sell you a chine direct or through an agent for nine months, in about three months an agent comes along who represents the company, whom you have never seen before; he asks you to give a note, at the same time tries to collect from you all he can before it is due, and telling you that the company is rich and will not push. But on the day after your note is due, a lawyer is at your heels and has already attached your property. The company may change the name of the firm after they earn a showing them up, but are not likely to change the name of the machine. All farmers should be wary of their agents, or they will get bit like I did.

A Good Thing.—In the Millennial Star of April 30th is the concluding portion of a very excellent paper from the pen of Elder Ben. E. Rich, son of Apostle C. C. Rich. 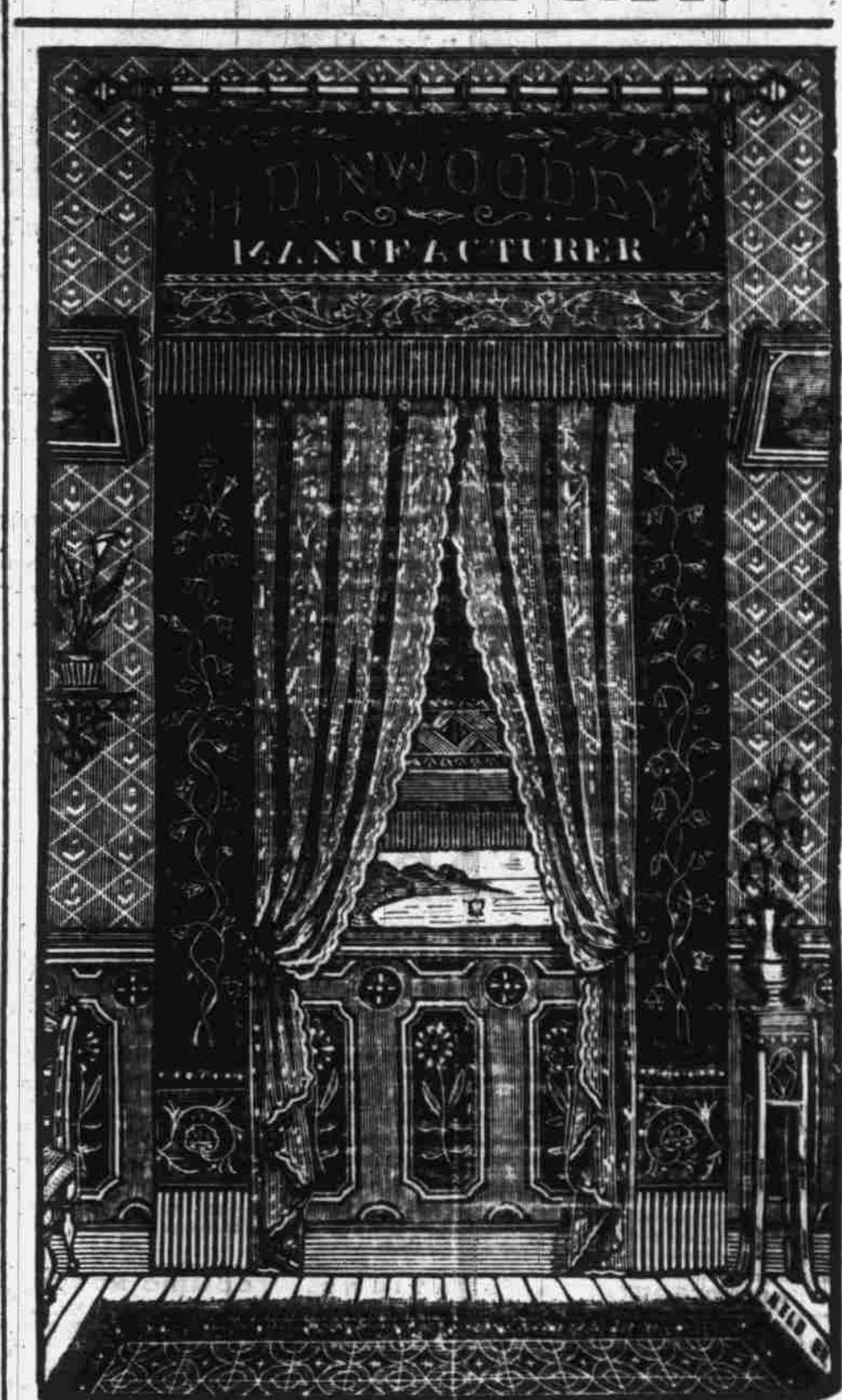
