

**A HISTORIC VILLAGE.**

**Old Home of Brigham Young and**  
Heber C. Kimball.

**VISIT TO MENDON, MONDAY, JULY 31.**

**The Memory of the Mormon Leaders**  
Christened in the Neighborhood  
Where They Formerly Lived.

In Saturday's News was an announcement of the return home of Mr. B. F. Cummings Jr., of the city, from an extended tour to the east, and he has furnished the following account of a visit made by him to the village of Mendon, Monroe County, New York, which has been made famous by the achievements of two men whom James A. Garfield, and who at least in some, recall their illustrious careers within its borders. Through Brigham Young and Heber C. Kimball were not natives of that village, yet living there they spent a portion of their lives which resulted in giving them a world wide fame.

The village contains a population of about 1,000, and is a steady, quiet and thriving place, a quiet agricultural town, the people of the city of Mendon, and is not remarkable merely by a railroad, the nearest being but a few miles to the west distant. This town is subject to its natural character. Being in the white pine belt, it is a timber town, and timber is the chief product. Mr. Cummings' first stop was at Mendon, a son of Brigham E. Cummings, who was a brother of Heber C. Kimball. Mr. Cummings called upon him and was received with great cordiality. Mr. Cummings is a man of moderate education, in his 50's years of age, is of active temper and industrious habits, simple and frank in his manner, and has a decided interest in the welfare of his countrymen. At one time he resided at Mendon, though his parents were originally in Mendon when he was raised. It is a common name, and coming west, he had a singular acquaintance with the name, and was struck by the similarity of character. They have three children, all of whom are young boys, who are at school.

Mr. Kimball spoke with enthusiasm, and said that the center of the town was always held in high regard by his brother Brigham, though the two differed radically in their religious views. Mr. Kimball now speaks very easily and respectfully of his brother, and of his son, Mr. Steven C. Kimball, who had visited Mendon to past year, when abroad on missions. His conversation is related that, in former years, he participated more or less in the efforts of his brother to convert the Indians, while, in recent years, at least, the love of study was not manifested on his part by even example.

Mr. Cummings arrived at Mr. Kimball's home Friday evening, July 26, and on the following day the latter took him in a buggy to certain points of interest. One of these was a small burying ground situated near a road leading to Mendon, and about a mile from the center of the village. In the days when Brigham Young and Heber C. Kimball lived in Mendon, a small named Lamont kept a tavern at the roadside, and from the vicinity of the same was named. On the passing the cross roads the buggy was driven southward along one of them, and past a row of five or six small frame houses, a few rods apart. They were all of a hewed timber structure. One house was a two-story, and the other, a single story, with a porch on the side, and a small entrance door. The porch was a single story, with a single step leading up to it. The porch was decorated with flowers, and the lower part was used as a sun porch. This was the home of Brigham Young and his wife with their four sons, and the house was well preserved.

After dinner, Mr. Cummings explained how this portion of the original building had been removed in its present size while the remainder was destroyed, and how that was not long ago, but it was not known when. The house was now divided into two rooms, but the frame and rafters were the original. The floor, if it was this floor, was about twenty feet long and about ten feet wide, and below would have made a large room, but had been cut down to a small room, and the lower part was used as a sun porch. This was the home of Brigham Young and his wife with their four sons, and the house was well preserved.

On the same premises was a chicken coop, partly constructed of pieces of a large picket fence, which was made by Brigham Young, and his own hands, and which, after his death, was sold to a neighbor, but the frame and rafters were the original.

Mr. Kimball seemed pleased to

see his former home to which they referred.
