The French customs show that \$2,000,000 worth of velocipedes have been exported from France this year.
A French proverb says that Paris is the paradise of women, the purgatory of men, and the hell of horses.
The Russian gun shops are hard at work making needle guns of the Baranov pattern; 700,000 of them to be done at once.
The authorities of Montreal have examined and condemned several buildings in that city, since the roof of St. Patrick's Hall fell in.
Mr. Higgins, the British astronomer, has demonstrated by experiment that heat from the principal fixed stars reaches the earth.
A man in Buffalo is the happy possessor of a four weeks old calf, which sports an eight-inch horn in the centre of its forehead.
The Trustees of Cornell University have been corresponding with John Stuart Mill with a view to his accepting a Chair in that institution.

Vernon Harcourt, the "Historicus" of the London Times, has been appointed Professor of International Law in the University of Cambridge (England).

The South End Unitarian Churches of Boston have established a "Bureau of Employment and Charity," with an office in one of their churches.

Mary C. Vaughan, well known to the readers of the New York Ledger as a writer of fiction, died recently—it is said—from the effects of unremitting literary labor.

A will has been thrown out in New Hampshire as fraudulent, on proof that the paper company whose imprint it bore, did not exist at the date of the will.

A young lady at Galena, Ill., lately took a long horseback ride in a fit of somnambulism. A belated boy was frightened at seeing a "woman in white" taking a midnight ride, and his screams of alarm awakened the sleeping rider.

At the new opera house in London the foot-lights, instead of burning up, burn with a downward flame into iron flues, under an artificial pressure of air, which also helps to carry off the smoke.

A London confectioner has appealed to Chancery to protect his copy-right in his design for a sweetmeat—an imitation in sugar of an oyster, which is affixed to and sold upon a real oyster shell. The Vice-Chancellor granted an injunction.

Leading trades unionists in England are organizing systematic emigration. It is believed that several thousand spinners and miners now on a strike and locked out at Preston and in Yorkshire will be aided to emigrate. A commissioner of inquiry is to be sent to this country.

The English Jewish Rabbi, Dr. Adler, declares that Judaism "believes that the sincere and virtuous professors of every religion may hope to enjoy future bliss." Which is an example of faith that would, if generally followed, make the world a good deal pleasanter place to live in than it is at present.

On a Kentucky railroad recently, while a train was passing through a tunnel, a young man attempted to kiss a girl who sat in front of him, when she seized his hand and bit out a large piece. When the cars emerged, the young man, wrapping up his bleeding hand, explained to inquiring friends how the "window fell on it."

The Paris Constitutionnel, the other day, gravely stated that a criminal in London, being sentenced to three months' imprisonment, tossed the magistrate whether it should be "double or quits," and the Alderman consenting, the prisoner won and was discharged.

A little boy and girl, each probably five years old, were by the roadside. As we came up, the boy became angry at something, and struck his playmate a sharp blow on the cheek, whereupon she sat down and began to cry piteously. The boy stood looking on sullenly for a minute, and then said: "I didn't mean to hurt you, Katie; I am sorry." The little rose face brightened instantly. The sobs subsided, and she said: "Well, if you are sorry, it don't hurt me."

Here is an interesting episode of Parisian life. A young man, who was an inveterate gambler, and who in a few years had lost 500,000 francs, had nothing left of a large fortune on the 1st of January but a few louis, after having sold everything. Almost mad with despair, he determined to try again, and in three days gained 30,000 francs. With this sum in his pocket he left for Nice, where, on the first evening of his arrival, he won 80,000 francs at the Cercle Massena. On the 10th he returned to Paris with 600,000 francs in his pocket. On the 15th he was worth over a million, which he invested in real estate.
