CONGRESSIONAL.

SHERMAN called up the bill for the
reduction of the revenue by abolishing the
Internal Revenue by abolishing the
Internal Revenue Commissioners and ex-
plained it, stating that it would save
between two and two and a half mil-
lion dollars annually. Sumner
asked whether the committee on finance had
considered the propriety of reducing
the number of collectors of internal
revenue. He said that the committee
was not yet ready to act. Those
familiar with the subject that the
number of collectors might be greatly
reduced without injury to the service.
Sherman said that in some large cities
it might be practicable to reduce the
number of collectors, but in the smaller
less thickly populated, besides, a reduc-
tion in the number of collectors would
not greatly reduce the expense, as they
were paid chiefly by fees depending
upon the amount of business done.
Trumbull argued that the law of last
June provided for a greater reduction
in the number of revenue collectors
than the bill would provide, as
better than none, as the law of June
had not been carried out. Sumner ar-
gued the administration for alleged
failure to carry out reforms in the rev-
enue service. Sherman defended the
administration, and after a close debate
the committee on finance voted to
adopt the bill.

The Boston relief bill was called up
by Wilson and discussed without ac-
tion, until 4 p.m., when the Senate
went into executive session and voted
it over adjourned.

NOT TO DAY

WASHINGTON, 12.—Dawes, from the
committee on ways and means reported
a bill authorizing the Secretary of the
Treasury to issue coupon bonds in ex-
change for registered bonds, the expense
of the charge to be paid by the owner.

After discussion the bill passed, year
136, page 22.

The House took up the soldiers'

bounty bill, and after a debate, a motion

of Hawley to recommit the bill

was rejected, yeas 90, nays 26. A sub-

stitute was offered by Holman and it

was then adopted, 102 to 62, and the

bill, as amended, passed, 115 to 56. The

bill, as passed, allows bounty funds to

be paid in the name of the soldier

or his heirs in person, or by an agent,

under such regulations as the secretary

of the interior may prescribe, but the

patent shall issue only to such soldier

or his widow or orphan children, but

no sale of such land or any interest

therein or power of attorney authoriz-
ing such sale or other contract of agree-
ment in any way affecting the conser-
vation of any such land made excepted or
entered into prior to the filing of the
patent therefor, and actual delivery of
the same to the person to whom issued
shall not be of any effect whatever, but
shall be null and void.

The deficiency appropriation bill was

reported. It appropriates \$10,000,000.

It was made the special order of the day.

The bill on the pension appropriation

bill, Garfield gave some statistical in-

formation with regard to pensions, stating

among other things, as a curi-

ous fact, that of the widows of the revo-

lutionary soldiers on the pension rolls,

less than ten per cent, had died during

the year. Over 35,000 pensioners were

put on the pension rolls during the year,

of whom over 17,000 were soldiers

alive at the end of the year.
