## WEATHER FORECAST.

The highest point reached by the thermometer today was 92.

**THEATRE.**—To-night the fine comedy, "The Serious Family," will be enacted, and the entertainment will conclude with the laughable farce of "Our Tom."

**THE CELEBRATION AT OGDEN.**—The *Centennial*, of yesterday, published a programme of the proceedings of the coming celebration of the Twenty-fourth at Ogden. There will be the usual firing of salutes and music early in the morning; afterwards a procession, in which the official, professional, mechanical and other departments will be represented, will be formed on the Tabernacle square. After marching of the procession, the citizens will assemble in a large bower on Union Square, where there will be speeches, music, singing, etc.

**COMMENDABLE.**—Mr. David Cardland, returned yesterday morning from a visit to Sanpete County. He speaks in unqualified praise of the progressive course being taken by the people of that county. He states that the fine meeting house there, which is rapidly approaching completion, will, when dedicated, be the largest of the kind in the West. It is the vision of \$200,000. The crop of that settlement will be excellent; about 100,000 bushels of wheat will probably be realized.

**ABOUT TO BE OPENED.**—Another of those new stores on East Temple St., that next to the 11th Ward Z. C. M. I., is about ready to be opened. These buildings have been erected up very rapidly. A little over two weeks ago the plastering of the two above mentioned stores had not been commenced, since which time James Coult and company have pushed through the work in that line, and it presents a solid and creditable appearance.

BITTNER.**—of the firm of Bittner & Bros., importers of and jobbers in foreign and domestic fruits and fancy groceries, Chicago, is in town for a few days, with the design of promoting the interests of his firm. We had a call from him, and a very pleasant interview with him this morning. We think the impromptu portion of the lecture was much the best, being entirely free from the stiffness of delivery, which generally characterizes written addresses of the kind. **DISCHARGED.**—We are informed by a W. U. T. dispatch, that a Mr. Wesley Roberts, who is said to have been, at one time, a prominent resident of Montana, and for the last two years of Los Angeles, Cal., was, at Malad City, Idaho, examined on a self-proffered charge of having killed a man near Taylor's Bridge, Snake River. It was clearly proven, by witnesses who were on the spot when the killing was done, that the act was wholly in self-defense, and entirely unavoidable, and Mr. Roberts was accordingly discharged.

**HYDE'S ROAD STEAMER.**—The following was received among our W. U. dispatches:

**STOCKTON, Utah, July 19th.**  
Hyde's overland steamer arrived last night from Lake Point. The running time averaged full two miles an hour. Much delay was experienced on the road by the irregular supply of water. The last six miles from Tule were run in two hours and twenty minutes, with a load of nine tons exclusive of the engine. It loads with ore and bullion to return to lake.

**MAIL IRREGULARITY.**—"A Subscriber" writing from Holden, Millard County, on the 15th, says considerable annoyance has been experienced there for some time on account of the non-arrival of the Weekly News, and that they had not received it for two weeks previous to the above date. This correspondent says he is creditably informed that sacks of mail matter are frequently left at Chicken Creek, on the pony express days. As the papers are mailed regularly from this office, the attention of those in charge of postal matters is requested to the above.

**DROWNED IN CACHA VALLEY.**—On the 15th inst., Brother Peter Christian Paulsen, a Dane, was drowned while bathing in Bear river. We are indebted to F. W. Young, Esq., of Newton, for the following details of the sad occurrence:

"While bathing with several boys and one man in Bear river, near Newton, Cache county, U. T., on the 15th inst., Peter Christian Paulsen got into deep water, and not being able to swim, was drowned. The man (Bro. A. Goodall) who was bathing at the time, some distance from him, went to his assistance, and waded down under the water, and only freed himself, after great exertion, from the grasp of the drowning man, who had him by one of his legs. The body was drawn out with a seine about one hour after, and was buried at Newton the next day.

He was born Jan. 3rd, 1845, at Wegger-slev, Rander's Amt, Denmark. Came across the plains in 1868. He was a single man, and has no known relatives in this country. He was a tall, well built man, of a quiet, gentlemanly disposition, and much respected by all who knew him."

**ALDERMAN'S COURT.**—C. M. Willard was brought before Dr. Clinton today on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences. The charge was preferred against him by a gentleman named Ammond, and others. The ground upon which the plaintiffs based the charge was that the defendant had been employed by them as a prospector for mines, they alleged that he had appropriated a portion of the means supplied to him for carrying on the work of prospecting to his own individual use. To give time for the necessary evidence to be produced, the examination was postponed until Tuesday next, the defendant being placed under \$500 bonds to appear on that day.
