A Conspiracy to Commit Wholesale

Murder.

CHICAGO, 11.—Continuing his speech

at the opening of the afternoon session

Mr. Walker defined the law of the

contentment at the efforts of certain

defendants to base their hopes of acquittal upon the

ground that they were not present at

the Haymarket when the bomb was

thrown, and charged that the leaders

in the conspiracy to commit wholesale

murder.

He then read from Most's instructions

to the defendants on the witness stand,

advising them first to save themselves

if possible, and if that proved impossible,

to use their position in the witness

chair to teach the principles of revolu-

tion.

"This," said the speaker, "was the

course followed by Parsons. Finding

no loophole for escape, he turned the

witness stand into the stool of propa-

ganda.

Walker was rewarded with a murmur
