erence is made to Utah and Nevada mines: Utah Consolidated—The ore in sight at the Highland Boy workings of the Utah Consolidated, is unofficially es-timated at 2,000,000 tons, the largest tonnage available at any time in this company's career. Owing to the comparative lack of smelting facilities, daily ore shipments are limited to \$50 tons, though as far as the mine is concerned, 1,500 tons could just as easily be supplied. The solution of the smelting prob-lem of this company will in all prob-ability be found in the construction of a new plant of ample capacity. By the time this can be completed, the Utah Consolidated territory will be commanded by a modern shaft, cap-able of handling the entire output. From a physical standpoint, Utah Consolidated looks decidedly attrac-tive. Its entire copper costs are well below 7 cents a pound. ## DEMOCRATIC CANVASS OF NEW YORK STATE.

New York, Sept. 24.—State Chair-man Conners made public today the figures of his preliminary canvass of the state, which, he said, show that Bryan will carry the state by 100,000 plurality. Mr. Conners said: "The reports received by me show that the Democrats will carry 31 out of 60 counties and that in Manhattan Mr. Bryan will receive 125,000 plur-ality and in Kings county he will re-ceive 25,000 plurality, making 150,000 plurality for Greater New York. Tatt will come down to the river with probaby 50,000 plurality, and Bryan will carry the state by a clear 100,000. Lieut. Gov. Chanler, however, will have at least the same Democratic plurality in the city and will come down to the river with a plurality that will exceed that of Hughes."
