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Operators Making a Determined Effort to Get a Reduction.

LUCKY BILL ELECTION.

The producers of the Tintic mining district are making a determined effort to induce the transportation companies to modify the existing tariff on ores shipped to the smelters from the camps

of Juah county. The committee appointed at the recent conference of operators, consisting of John Dern, George W. Heintz, P. T. Farnsworth and Harry S. Joseph, has prepared a petition asking that a rate of \$1 per ton be granted on ores having a net value of \$10 per ton and less; \$1.50 a her value of \$19 per 100 and 1088; \$1.30 on ore having a bet value of \$10 to \$20 per ton and \$3 on all one carrying val-ues exceeding \$20 per ton net. The railroads now charge \$1.50 per ton on ore not exceeding \$15 per ton in value, while \$2.50 is charged on all ores carry-ing values in evices of that sum

ing values in excess of that sum. There is an immense tonnage of ore in the mines of the Tintie district which the amelters of the Salt Lake valley could use if the railroads will make such concessions that would enable a small margin of profit to the operato -= With the present tariff in force, it is claimed, even with the prevaiing prices of the metals, the ores are too low grade to warrant extraction.

WHITTEMORE IN NEVADA.

Salt Lake Route's General Attorney Talks About Road to Bullfrog.

Attorney C. O. Whittemore of the Salt Lake railroad has been at the Montgomery hotel several days on gal business connected with the build-ing of the Clark branch. He says the railroad will reach Beatty about July 15, and the line will then be extended north to Goldfield and Tonopah, says

the Miner of Beatty, Nev. Surveys will be made immediately over the Amargona river route, and also via Gold Bar and Gold Mountain to the west of the other lines. If a good route can be found yla Gold Mountain will be used to avoid conflict with the other fullroads in the Amargosa

In any event the Clark railroad will first come to Beatty, thence to Rhyol-ite and probably to the Gold Bar Har mines. If a route can be found via Gold Mountain it will be adopted by en a new mining section; but if not the Amargosa valley route will be ta-ken to Goldfield.

The grade between Beatty and Rhyol-ite is not as good as might be desired, helug in places 3 per cent; but power-ful locomotives can be used to draw rains. Beatty would have something to

gain and nothing to lose by the adop-tion of the Gold Mountain route. All diroad men recognize the fact that Beatty must be a division point for all lines, and the opening of new camps will add to the importance of Beatty as a distributing point.
