Kansas City Stock Yards, Feb. 24.-Storms last week interfered with cattle receipts somewhat, and prices advanced steadily till Friday, when there was a loss of 10 to 15 cents. Buyers anticipated good runs this week, because of the delayed movement last week, and were bearish Friday in con-sequence. Run is 9,000 head today, not as heavy as expected, killing grades strong, stockers and feeders 10 cents higher, as usual on Monday. The first shipment of the Lockhart steers this season are here today, weighing 1.430 pounds, at \$5.25. Colorado stockers late.
