One objection to spraying is that on the farm it cannot always be done at

the proper time. One of the best ways of fighting insect pests in the orchard is to sow cow Deas.

As warm weather comes on more oats and less corn should be given to the work teams.

Cultivation in the garden should commence before the weeds get a chance to start. With all cultivated crops the groun

should at no time be allowed to bake after the crop is planted.
