"I now publicly declare that my ad-vice to the Latter-day Saints is to re-train from contracting any marriage forbidden by the law of the land."

The resolution passed by the General Conference ratifying this advice was that.

"We accept his declaration concern ing plursl marriage as authoritative and binding."

According to Mrs. Allen's charge before the Congress of Mothers at Detrolt, the whole male membership of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints except a few old men have been rushing into marriages "forbidden by the law of the land." As there is not a particle of reliable evidence to substantiate the statement, it places the accuser in a not very enviable position before truthloving people. We know that some very religious folks, following the lead of their preachers, are endeavoring to create that impression, but it is outrageously false, and we firmly believe the object they have in view in promulgating it will fall. It is disclosed this extract from Mrs. Allen's speech:

"One of the apostles of the Church, bound by most solemn oaths to be loyal first to his Church, has been virtually making body. He is there not to leg-islate for the country, though inciden-tally he will do this for the sole ad-vantage of his Church. He is placed there to apologize for the practice of his co-religionists, to prevent restric-tive legislation, to assist them in evanrelization and the importation of their converts from other countries. That sort of thing might be extended by the Congress of Mothers to thousands of abandoned wives and families in the blg Christian cities of the land. The "manifesto" contemplated no abandonment of wive or families.
