TO EXHIBIT ADULTERANTS.

At Thursday afternoon's meeting of the pure food bureau it was decided to appropriate \$50 toward the bureau exhibit at the coming food show in this city, the exhibit to be prepared by chemist Harnes, containing samples of substances commonly used in the adulteration of foods, such as benzoate of soda, coloring agents, and various chemical preparations, with meat emulsifying processes. Most of the exhibit will be retained at the office of the bureau after the close of the show. Dr. R. D. Brinshall, government inspector attached to the local bureau of animal industry, explained to the meeting plans for testing cover for tuberculosis. The state officials will co-operate with the government in this matter. The proper labeling of foods was also discussed.

JOSEPH E. CAINE SUCCEEDS HARRIS

Appointed Secretary of Commercial Club by Board of Governors.

HAS BEEN ACTIVE WORKER

New Official Well Qualified to Direct Work Left Unfinished by Secretary Harris.

Joseph E. Caine was yesterday chosen to succeed the late Fisher S. Harris as secretary of the Commercial club by the board of governors of that organization. He has been very generally regarded as the best fitted man to fill the exacting position, but it was not thought that he would sacrifice his large business interests in favor of the club. It was only after very serious consideration and much pressure on the part of club members that his consent was given.

The new secretary is eminently qualified to lead the doing of the Commercial club and to direct the work that had been planned and left unfinished by the late secretary. He has been a member of the club for over six years and in that time has been a member of most of the more important committees. Ever active in all that pertained to the success of the club's projects, never stalling time or labor in his endeavors to "push things along," Mr. Caine has ever stood out as one man who would put his shoulder to the wheel.

The new secretary was born in Salt Lake 45 years ago. He went through the public schools, the University of Utah, and then made up his mind to become a farmer. A short experience in the Maryland Agricultural college convinced him of his mistake and then he donned the uniform of the army at West Point. The humdrum of this did not come up to his idea of what the life of a man should be whose blood ran red and he resigned to enter newspaper work. He returned to Salt Lake and devoted his hustling abilities in getting news for the Herald, Tribune, and Democrat.

During the Spanish war Mr. Caine was captain of First troop, Utah Volunteer Cavalry, but the troop only got as far as San Francisco, where after being in command of one of the posts for some time, Mr. Caine was mustered out.

After the war his wandering spirit sought for the congenial work and finally buckled down as cashier of the Utah Commercial & Savings bank, where he acquired a very valuable business training, during the five and one-half years which he held the position. His active mind took in the possible future of the Nevada mining country and his next jump was into this field.

In Nevada he rapidly became a prominent man. He promoted the Ludwig deal, involving over a million. He bought and sold many properties and still holds an interest in the Territorial Copper company. Locally he is manager of the firm of Caine & Hooper.

The new secretary said this morning that he intended to gradually draw out of his other businesses and devote all of his time to his new work.

"I have a mighty big pair of shoes to fill," he said, "and I expect that I'll do considerable wobbling about in them. But I feel that I never could have accomplished that which Mr. Harris brought to such a state of perfection. But he has left things in such a splendid shape that it makes it comparatively easy for me."

THE HARRIS HOME.
Mr. Caine has already received a number of subscriptions for the home to be purchased for Mrs. Harris. It has been decided to give an opportunity to all who desire to contribute to this fund, this decision having been reached by the club because of numerous requests to be allowed to help in the good cause. All contributions will be received by the new secretary.

Under the most favorable conditions Mr. Caine takes up his new duties. The club is in splendid shape financially and much work had been mapped out by the late secretary which will be carried out in the minutes detail. Mr. Caine said that months would be consumed before it would be necessary to take up any other new project other than those which came up from time to time.

NEW CLUBHOUSE.
At the club this afternoon a joint meeting of the house and finance committees was held and the matter of furnishing the new clubhouse on Exchange place came up for consideration. Decorations from many cities have been received, and the committee is now endeavoring to select a number of these presented designs. Nothing definite in regard to the decoration was determined upon.

The forty rooms in the new clubhouse are being eagerly sought, applications having been made for nearly all of them. At the meeting this afternoon rates were placed upon them.
