PARTRIDGE MAY ESCAPE.

Young Partridge, the man who is charged with a felony against the unfortunate Nielsen girl, who suicided yesterday, does not seem to take her death to heart. When he was told of the occurrence by Deputy Sheriff Barnett he appeared indifferent, and asked to have his trial postponed to the 31st, that he might "see what they have to say about me." His hearing will take place today; it is considered very doubtful if he can be convicted now that the testimony of the girl cannot be had.

Under the sub-head, "Father Heart-broken" in the "News" account of the suicide the statement appears that the girl "has been treated with every consideration during her stay here." This is somewhat contradictory of the general trend of the article, and is the result of an error through telephonic communication. It was feared by the "News" representative that the public might think the father had upbraided the girl and that lack of sympathy on his part had contributed to the rash act which caused her death. And in justice to the sorely afflicted and heartbroken man the statement was made, that he had treated her with the utmost kindness and sympathy, and that all who have been connected with the case since it became public, have done this. The treatment on the part of Partridge, and probably some others who were interested with him, speaks for itself. Since Partridge's arrest and since the outrage committed against the child has become known, several respectable plunders from both places at different times.
