## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**Jubilee Celebration.**—Preparations are under way for a grand jubilee celebration in the Tabernacle on the 24th of July. The general committee, who have the matter in hand, will meet this evening in the Council House to further consider the subject, appoint sub-committees and make other arrangements for the coming event.

**Birthday Sociable.**—Sunday evening a pleasant family gathering was held at the residence of Apostle F.D. Richards, in Ogden, the event being the 31st anniversary of the birth of his son, F. S. Richards, Esq., the popular and efficient prosecuting attorney of Weber County. We heartily join in all the good wishes expressed on the occasion, and wish friend Frank numerous happy returns of the day that witnessed his terrestrial advent.

**Women's Silk Culture.**—From the circular of the Women's Silk Culture Association, whose office is at 1326 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, we learn that a school has been opened there for the education of persons in the raising of silk-worms, reeling of the silk from cocoons and other matters pertaining to sericulture. The association has but recently sprung into existence. Its officers have sent to Father Graves, the veteran sericulturist of Utah, for copies of his treatise on the subject, and it is the intention to send gratuitously the number they require. We are pleased to see that other ladies of the nation, besides those of our own Territory, are engaging in this important enterprise, with the avowed purpose of cultivating an interest in home manufactures, and more so, that the latter can claim the honor of setting the worthy example to so distinguished a city as Philadelphia.

**Logan Locals.**—From the Leader of Friday:

On Saturday a herd of cattle passed through this place, destined for the stock markets at Evanston, and the Powder river country. The animals were said to number nearly 4,000 head. They were obtained principally in Idaho; and were owned by Messrs. Parsons and Whitney of Salt Lake.

A few days since, a young boy residing at Hyrum, named Lehi Curtis, fell on some rocks and severely injured his right arm. He was carried to his father's house, made as comfortable as possible; and a doctor was sent for. He made an examination and found that the arm had been broken between the wrist and elbow. The bones were set, and now the patient is progressing favorably.

On Monday evening, while Mr. Ed. Holden was handling some heavy boxes of freight at the depot, he had the misfortune to receive a serious injury to his right hand. A box had been elevated to a considerable height when the supports gave way, and it fell, catching his hand on the platform. The bones were bruised, and the flesh painfully mutilated. Several stitches were necessary in order to bring the injured parts together. In all probability Mr. Holden will in time regain the full use of his hand.
