## The Bright Side of Farming.

There is a way to accomplish every  
possible result in this life if one has  
only the patience and skill to find it out.  
Often, too, the skill is born of patient  
endurance. Thus it is in medicine.

A striking illustration of the truth of  
these sayings is shown in a Connecticut  
farm at New Canaan. The land consists  
mostly of rocky hilltops, with boulders  
scattered all over the surface.  
These had to be dug out by hand before  
any crop could grow there. The large  
and great interests of the country  
long since went to the far west. It  
would be madness for a New England  
farmer to attempt grain farming in  
connection with the west. Yet here are  
these same hilltops, with no good soil  
very convenient, with the rock  
covered with thin soil, where a man would  
think he is in the best part of the world.  
Brothers, here are hillsides a couple  
of miles apart, where a man would  
think he is in the best part of the world.  
How did they do it? They accomplished  
it by thoroughly understanding what  
they can do with their land. Their father  
begins the business before them by start-  
ing a nursery. He says that something  
must be done, or he would be lost.  
He has a long list of abandoned New  
England farms, to be bought cheaply and  
continually changing his farming to fresh  
and forest tree raising. There are now  
500 acres in nursery, all thriving and  
paying well. But it is watched and  
taught as carefully as if it were a rich  
man's orchard, and improved much  
more rapidly. The trees are planted  
as soon as possible as they are known  
to be reliable. The parents  
say that their paying crops are  
now 1000 acres, and will increase  
continually. The farm now contains 2000  
acres, all in the way to promote the in-  
terests of the paying crops. In order  
that there may be no waste, and that the  
root may be set out of every foot of  
land, 300 pigs are raised annually  
and daily ones are kept. Besides there are  
for work fifteen horses and six oxen.  
Thirty men are employed and housed  
on the place. Nearly everything produced  
on this model farm is consumed  
on the place—except the money taxes.  
The cost of the Connecticut farm was  
as impossible as will could be, and the  
market for the little salt could be raised  
if it was not much higher. Yet here are  
two men who enjoy every comfort  
that money can buy, and are accumulating  
money through the sale of their lands.
