Committee on Foreign Relations Will Meet Today to Consider Proper Retaliation Against Neighbor,

> Washington, March 31 .--- Some of the combers of the senate committee on oreign relations have decided to recomnend that the committee, in view of Venezuela's refusal to arbitrate pending American claims, report to the senate resolutions providing for retaliation either by prohibitive tariff on coffee, he exclusion of Venezuelan asphalt or outhorization of the president to deal

vith Venezuela as he desires. The committee will meet tomorrow. Washington, March 31.—The president today sent to the senate the Venezuélan correspondence called for by the Lodge resolution. This correspondence covers the history of the five American claims which this government has so far in vain sought to have President Castro agree to arbitrate. They are the Jaurell claim, the Orinoco corporation claim, the Orinoco Steamship company claim, the United States & Venezuela company (commonly known as the Critchfield)

(commonly known as the Critichfield) claim, and the New York & Bermudez Asphalt company claim. In explanation of the latter, the fam-ous "Calhoun" report is for the first time made public. This does not absolve the asphalt company from blame in in-

the asphalt company from blame in in-citing the Matos rebellion against Pres-ident Castro. Strong language is used by the solicitor of the state department by the solution of the state department in urging a vigorous prosecution of all these claims, and he holds that "the time has come for language stronger than that employed in a request, and if the demand be met with procrastina-tion or refusal, the dignity of this gov-ernment would seem to require prompt and vigorous action." and vigorous action.

OPINION OF SECY, FISH. He also quotes Secy. Fish as saying: "It is useless to attempt to exhaust justice in a country where there is no justice to exhaust." The solicitor's presentation abounds in other vigorous expressions of this

sort. No suggestion or recommendation is made by either President Roosevelt or Secy. Root in transmitting the corre-spondence to the senate. Secy. Government Agents Think He **Operated Gigantic Frauds**

In This Country.

NOTED SWINDLER

San Francisco, April L.-In the arrest of Earl Accola, which was effected Monday by the United States postal inspector, O'Connell, here, the federal authorities believe that they have capturd one of the two men who flimflammed several large business houses in different sections of the United States during the last year. Accola, together with Fred E. Wolff, was indicted by the Chicago grand jury March 6 on several counts charging him with having used the mails to carry on a fraud.

fraud. According to the federal officers Ac-cola and Wolff did business under the firm name of George E. Anderson & Co. There is a reputable mail order house in Chicago which has a name similar to the one used by Accola and Wolff. Among the concerns which were victimized were Max Platt & Co. 113 Division street, New York; the Winona Fur & Glove clompany, Winona, Minn., and the Northern Fur & Manufacturing company of Minneapolis.

CRUISER MONTANA MAKES SUCCESSFUL TRIAL TRIP

Rockland, Maine, April 1 .- The ar-Rockiand, Maine, April L.-The ar-mored cruiser Montana left today for a series of 12 runs over the Rockiand nile course, which were to comprise her official screw standardization trial. A northwest gale was blowing and the wind, shifting suddenly to about west, kicked up a heavy sea. This handi-capped the craft, but the trial was con-tibuted.
