Returning to Snowville on Saturday after a few days' absence my attention was called to a remarkable incident which occurred last week. Mr. W. A Sellers, a man 41 years of age, who has resided in Utah about four months, left his home at Springville to come out this way for the purpose of visiting some relatives and purchasing some land.
