### MEETING OF CITY SOLONS.

## SNOWVILLE.

Thrilling Experience on the Desert—Becomes Insane Through Exposure.

Snowville, Boxelder Co., March 4.—Returning to Snowville on Saturday after a few days' absence my attention was called to a remarkable incident which occurred last week. Mr. W. A. Sellers, a man 41 years of age, who has resided in Utah about four months, was seen by a neighbor, who reported that he was on his way to the purpose of visiting some relatives and purchasing some land. He came by railway to Promontory Station, and being a little disappointed about obtaining a conveyance from Salt Lake City, he took a horse and buggy and rode to Snowville, where he was met by a man who called "turned round" he traveled apparently northeast, instead of northwest, as he was directed. On Wednesday evening some travelers from Salt Lake City reported that they saw a man about twelve miles east from here who talked and acted strangely. The next morning Messrs. Levi and Hyrum Peterson went to the place designated and there found a man husky enough to go through the motions as would be required in loading a vehicle with rocks. Speaking to him, he talked soon convinced them that he was insane. They induced him to ride with them and brought him to Snowville. On the way he talked with young ladies whom he imagined he could see, gave them money and in various ways showed that fantasy rather than reason controlled his actions. Through food being given him and care bestowed upon him his rants gradually returned and he now rejoices that he was not permitted to wander until death should relieve him. He claims to have lost \$200 in some manner since he left Promontory. He has a daughter, Mrs. James C. Peterson, and a son, Mrs. Jensen to a girl on the 27th. All parties doing well. Some cases of sickness still exist amongst the children out here, such as grip, pneumonia, etc.

## HELD FOR LARCENY.

J. H. Carter, who was brought here from Blackfoot last week on Saturday had a hearing before Justice Smith on the charge of larceny. Carter claimed he had purchased the outfit from Kent, with the agreement that payment be made in June. After reviewing the evidence, however, the justice held Carter for the district court in \$500 bonds. Security was not furnished.
