McCloskey Signs a New Man Who

HE IS BABBIT OF SEATTLE.

Local Team Captured Yesterday After-

Manager McCloskey of the Salt Lake baseball team has signed former short stop Babbit of the Seattle nine, and he at once put him in the box to pitch. That he understands how to dish out mysteries in the way of curved balls is evident from the fact that he won his game against Seattle yesterday afternoon, the score being four to three.

He pitched a splendid game from start to finish and was given all the assistance by the team behind him that he could reasonably ask for.

Among the pleasing features of yesterday's game was Hanley's catch of a fly in the first inning and securing a put out at the home sack. It was a very pretty double, and as it cut off a run Hanley was cheered to the echo. Flannery also made a nice throw home, but was too late to beat off the runner. He stopped a fast grounder, but it was not his fault that the runner had lead enough to land him safe at home.

The race issue plank which is re-

garded as the most important plank

in the platform declares for white

supremacy in state, county and mu-

nicipal government. The clause relat-

ing to the race question is as follows:

"We believe that the political desti-

ny of Maryland should be shaped

and controlled by the white people of

the state and while we disclaim any

purpose to do any injustice whatever

to our colored population, we declare

without reserve our resolute purpose

to preserve in every conservative and

constitutional way the political as-

cendancy of our race."

The remainder of the platform re-

lates to state issues.

tle and Tacoma, from Seattle and Tac-

Renton railway. It also cuts off the

lights from Renton and Tacoma.
