Buttars Damage Suit Dismissed. Special Correspondence, Logan, Cache Co., Jan. 31 .- In the re-

Logan, Cache Co., Jan. 31.—In the re-port of the anti-vaccination meeting held in this city on the evening of Jan. 24th, an inaccuracy crept in as to the resolutions adopted. When the "News" correspondent called on the chairman of the committee on resolutions for a copy of the resolutions adopted by the meeting, a copy of the same as they ap-peared in the "News" of Jan. 26th, was handed him. It now transpires that the copy handed the reporter was the orig-inal draft considered by the committee, and not the same as those recommended by the committee and adopted by the meeting. The only important change, however, is in the last clause of the however, is in the last clause of the preamble, but members of the resolution committee do not care to go upon record with such drastic sentiments regarding vaccination, us some of them, while believing in the principle of vaccination as scientifically correct, do not deem present conditions justify compulsory vaccination. The committee there-fore requests the "News" to publish the resolutions as adopted by the meeting

which are as follows: RESOLUTIONS AGAINST COMPUL-SION.

Whereas, a determined effort is being made by the state board of health to enforce compulsory vaccination upon

the people of Logan city or close our public schools and colleges. Whereas, We, the citizens of Logan, do not believe that the laws of the the state of Utah nor the exigency of the situation justify any such measures even if vaccination would tend to ame-liorate the severity of smallpox, and

Whereas. The efficiency of vaccina-tion is as yet an undecided question among the different schools of the medi-cal profession itself, therefore be it Resolved, That we denounce the ac-tion of the state board of health as unwarranted, unnecessary and tyrannical, and we condemn their efforts to close our schools and colleges against healthy un-vaccinated children and students as being subversive of the educational
