

# WILL AGREE TO ANY OLD TERMS

McClintic Says No Reason Why Nelson Should Not Meet Hyland.

## PETE SULLIVAN IS WILLING

Will Take on Any Lightweight Champion May Select—George Memic Not Heard From Yet.

"You can say for me that I will match Hyland with Battling Nelson at any time the date is willing to put his name in a set of articles and that Nelson may dictate the terms as to weight, division of the money or anything else. Any terms that suits Nelson will suit us. Now let him come through with an agreement and if the match is made, the fans will witness a ring contest that will be worth going hundreds of miles to see."

So spoke Sammy McClintic, manager of "Fighting Dick" Hyland. Sammy says he means every word of it and that he is not asking for the best of it in any way. Word is expected from Nelson within a day or two and then it is likely some definite arrangements will be made. Local fans recognize that a match of this kind would be the best that could be made and he so declares, that there is nothing in the way of the match. Johnnie Chapman says he expects to hear from George Memic today. The latter has been offered a match with Pete Sullivan. Sullivan has notified Chapman that he is perfectly willing to take on Memic and that if the latter backs out, he will meet any lightweight champion may select. Like McClintic, Sullivan says he will agree to almost anything to secure a match. He is expected here this evening and if the match is clinched will begin training at once. If Memic does not care to come a match between Sullivan and Hyland might be arranged, but McClintic has his heart set on a meeting with Nelson. If he means business there is no doubt that the date's consent will be secured.

## HELEN KELLER'S TEACHER IS GOING BLIND.

New York, Jan. 16.—News comes to New York from Wrentham, Mass., that Mrs. John Albert Macy, who was Miss Anne Mansfield Sullivan, for 20 years the companion of Helen Keller, is going blind. Mrs. Macy is afflicted with traumatic cataract and it is feared she will entirely lose her eyesight. It is her education and the fact that she is today a living example of the fact that love and patience can overcome the worst of afflictions. Until Helen Keller was seven years old she sat in darkness and silence, being deaf, dumb and blind. Then Miss Sullivan, as she was then, mastered the means of communication with the girl and by the touch language which she invented, began her education. The story of Miss Keller and her achievements is known to everyone, and it is to the woman whose friends now have been losing her sight, that she owes it all. For 20 years the two have been

constant companions and it was through his interest in Miss Keller when she entered Radcliffe college that Professor Macy, at the time an instructor in Harvard, became acquainted with Miss Sullivan. Professor Macy and Miss Sullivan were married in May, 1905, and since then have made their home with Miss Keller at Wrentham. Professor Macy is now one of the editors of "The Youth's Companion" and wrote the introduction to Miss Keller's book, "The Story of Life."

## MOVING PICTURE ACCIDENT.

Machine Explodes and Causes Panic in Small Theater.

St. Catharines, Ont., Jan. 16.—Fire following the explosion of a moving picture machine occurred last evening in the Hippodrome, a small theater. The audience numbered about 50, principally women and children, several of whom were painfully hurt by being trampled upon in a mad rush for the streets. Lorene McDermott, aged 15, was fatally burned. The damage is \$4,000.

## JOHN F. BETZ DEAD.

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 16.—John F. Betz, one of the best known brewers in the country and one of Philadelphia's wealthiest citizens, died at his home here today, after a long illness. Mr. Betz was born in Germany in 1811 and was brought to this country when an infant. He was largely interested in several financial institutions of Philadelphia. John F. Betz, Jr., a son by his first wife, will succeed the father in his extensive interests.

Mr. Betz, although a Lutheran, was a Chevalier of St. Gregory by grant of the late Pope Leo XIII. This honor was an unusual one. His first wife was a member of a well known Catholic family of Stuttgart, Germany.

## EDWARDS OF GEORGIA WANTS HOUSE TO GET TO WORK

Washington, Jan. 16.—A resolution reading in part as follows was offered in the house today by Mr. Edwards of Georgia:

"Whereas, people and business institutions of all kinds are suffering from the panic that is upon us and the whole country is demanding that something be done for relief; and whereas, the house of representatives has now been in session for over 30 days and has accomplished absolutely nothing along these lines, but instead is killing time upon matters that are not nearly so vital; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That 9 o'clock in the morning be fixed as the hour for convening, instead of 10 o'clock noon, and that the hours from 1 to 2 be allowed for lunch and that the house remain in session until 6 o'clock in the afternoon or later if necessary, in order that we may get down to work, do something for the country and adjourn before hot weather comes on."

The resolution was referred to the committee on rules.
