They then commenced a long continued search to obtain some clue to the child's whereabouts, but their efforts were in vain; until, finally, the rascally shoemsker. being assured of the protection of the papal police, admitted that he had been consigned to the care of the Catholic priests.

Bordering on distraction the poor mother flew to the establishment of the Catecumeni, but was refused admission or a sight of her child. Day after day she would spend hours in front of the institution in hopes of seeing him, for which she was finally imprisoned by the papal authorities, and ultimately lost her senses through her grief.

SOUTH CAROLINA. **Bailroad** Accident.

COLUMBIA, S. C., 11 .- A terrible accilent occurred on the Greenville and Columbia Railroad, yesterday, about twelve miles above Columbia. The passenger train, due here at 3:5 p. m., from Greenville, fell through a bridge, and the baggage and passenger cars were precipitated to the ground, a distance of twenty-five feet. One passenger car remained on the track, being supported by the wreck. A relief-train was dispatched to the scene and returned with the dead and wounded last night. Mrs. Phillip Fogarty, of Charleston, was killed, as were Chas. Jay, of Newberry, S. C., Grace Montague, (colored) stewardess, and Minerva Parr, (colored); the following were fatally in-jared: Stephen Smith, of Newberry, and Holston Lomox, (colored) State Senator.

CHARLESTON, 11.—The accident; on the Greenville and Columbia Railroad was caused by the breaking of a wheel throwing a portion of the train off the track while passing over the trestle, causing the trestle to give way and precipitating the mail car, second class and two other passenger cars to the ground. Tours, 11 .- The journals report that the Prussians have lost over ten thousand killed and wounded and eighteen hundred prisoners in battles around Orleans and that they are retreating towards Chartres and Etampes. A large number of guns were thrown away by the enemy and had been pick-ed up and distributed among the na-tional guards at Orleans. The entire army of the Loire is moving forward. The military department of the East has been abolished and General Michael, who held the chief command there, has been assigned to snother duty.

A dispatch from Chagney reports a large French force there, well supplied with artillery sufficient to resist the advance of the enemy. The troops from Lyons are marching to meet the Prussians.
