How Shipment of Oleomargerine Was handled in Salt Lake.

City Food inspector J. J. Meyers got onto the fact, the other day, that a big consignment of oleomargarine had been shipped in here, and distributed among the local grocery houses. He investigated and found that a carload of the stuff had been sent to this city from Denver. The sale of the same was promptly stopped by the inspector, whereupon the groterymen wired to the Denver consignors that the city food inspector had stopped the sale. The Denver people wired back, "To h- with the inspector, go ahead and sell the goods

But the inspector refused to allow the sale of the oleomargarine unless it was sale of the one-margarine unless it was branded and advertised for just what it was. He had samples analyzed and found it nice, clean fat, colored beau-tifully and of the proper consistency; but butter—it was not. The Salt Lake dealers wired again to Denver that the food inspector continued unprovided. food inspector continued unpropitious and could not be talked over. It was impossible to sell the oleomargarine, and settlement for the same was therefore declined. The Denver shippers then wired to send the oleo back to Denver, and thither it went, with the Colorado shippers "out" the freight on both ways. Oleomargarine costs 7 cents; butter sells wholesale at 2216 to 25 cents-and the difference, well, it is considered worth striving for.
