LOCAL BRIEFS.

Second Juvenile Band—A second juvenile band has been organized by Judge Willis Brown, of 21 boys, and concerts are proposed.

W. E. Germaine Dead—W. E. Germaine, formerly of Los Gatos, Cal., where he had been living for a year.

New Apartment—E. P. Knott is now preparing to erect an apartment house on his new purchase, corner of O and Second streets, to cost nearly \$5,000.

Large Force At Work—Prof. G. L. Swenson returned last evening, from the Strawberry tunnel, and reported 119 men at work there. Forty feet of excavation has already been made.

Did Quick Work—A gang of eight men in less than eight hours completed yesterday, the false work for the proposed concrete bridge over the Jordan river at Fourteenth South street.

Commercial Club Building—Architects are preparing sketches for a building for the Commercial club, which will be placed on exhibition as soon as completed, in the club rooms. Some of the plans will be quite pretentious.

First Varsity Dance—The executive committee of the associated students of the college, in connection with the opening dance of the season at the university. The college orchestra will be allowed representation on the student body. The committee will meet regularly on Mondays.

Inspected Fixtures—Adjt. Gen. R. C. Naylor has returned from Ogden where he went to inspect the new furniture and fixtures for the new company E army which has been accepted by the state. Gen. Naylor speaks highly of the personnel of Company B, and says a second company will be organized in Ogden before long.

Site For Reservoir—State Engineer Tanner has returned from Pangulth, where, with members of the land board, he went to look over the site for the proposed Hatch reservoir, which will reclaim 15,000 acres of land. The reservoir will be of 13,000 acre feet capacity, and the dam 55 feet high. The canals will aggregate 15 miles in length.

Groves Released—Harry Groves will not have to return to Goldfield, Nev., to stand trial upon the charge of leasing bad checks in "Tex" Rickard's gambling house. He was ordered released by Judge Whitaker of the city court yesterday afternoon, and his cash bail of \$500 was also released. The action was taken upon motion of Asst. County Atty. Hanson.

Six Months For Bailey—Judge Whittaker yesterday sentenced Roy E. Bailey to six months in the county jail for petit larceny. Bailey was charged with burglarizing the May drug store at the corner of Second and Third East streets and stole \$4.85. He was allowed to plead guilty to petit larceny and the case charging him with burglary was dismissed in the district court.

Junior Elect Officers—The university juniors elected these officers yesterday, for the ensuing academic year: President, Earl Haveron; vice president, J. R. Stewart; secretary, Miss Musgrave; treasurer, B. S. Bowman; executive committee, J. M. Harker, Roy Hatch, Harold Stephens and E. Morgan. The executive committee was instructed to arrange for the junior promenade concert.

New Society Formed—The medical students at the university have organized the Aesculapian Medical society, with these officers: President, F. J. Howells; vice president, O. H. Johnson; secretary and treasurer, C. Openshaw; committee on credentials, D. B. Anderson and C. A. Broad; entertainment committee, Roy Hatch and E. D. Whitaker. The society will give a dance on Halloween.

Austrian Well Armed—Mike Hilda, an Austrian, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Officer Carlson, and locked up on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. The man was on Commercial street and his actions excited the suspicions of the officer. He was taken into custody, and when he was searched a revolver, a dirk and a dagger were found on his person. He put up \$15 bail and was released.

Boy Badly Hurt—A driver who is not only grossly reckless, but entirely lacking in feeling, early yesterday morning ran down and severely injured a lad named John Hokanson. The boy was crossing South Temple street, at the corner of Second West when a rapidly driven single bucked ran upon him and he was knocked down and rendered unconscious. The driver did not stop to see what injury had been done to the young man. The boy was taken to St. Mark's hospital, where he is now lying. Dr. E. S. Wright was called to attend him. He was considerably bruised and shaken up, but the real extent of his injuries has not been determined.

Miss Miller's Funeral—Most impressive services were held yesterday afternoon over the remains of Miss Allie Miller. The funeral was held at the residence of her sister, Mrs. H. H. Reardon, 215 E. Second, Dean Brewster of St. Mark's church officiating. The house and grounds were thronged with sympathizing friends of the family, and the floral were as beautiful as profuse. A stringed quartet, led by Prof. Arthur Shepherd, and a vocal quartet, composed of Mrs. Lizzy Thomas Edwards, Mrs. Elsie Barrow Best, Horace E. Ensign and Fred C. Graham, furnished music for the occasion, and Dean Brewster read the burial service. The Grand Young Jr., David Turpey, James and Walker Salasburg, Owyne Officer and Charles S. Morris, school friends of deceased, were the pallbearers, and the remains were interred in the City cemetery.
