The Cygnet People to Erect a Mill When a Flow is Encountered.

Mr. Benton of the Cygnet mine of Stockton said this morning that the company had ceased shipments from the mine, while walting for the broad-gauging of the Tooele branch of the Oregon Short Line. As that work will not be completed until some time in with iron and bi January, they have decided to begin eral shafts have shipping again and continue it regularby. The Cygnet ground joins the Honerin in the Stockton mining disfound in every or trict, and is now being worked by a force of sixteen men. In common with all properties in the district, it contains large bodies of concentrating ore. and the development work now being done in the mine is the sinking of a shaft to water. It is the intention of the management to install a concentrating plant as soon as water has been found so as to handle these base ores. Work on this shaft is being pushed, and the water level is expected to be encountered within the next 150 feet if not before.

Wyoming Copper Strike.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Dec. 10.—The report of the rich strike in the Cooney Hills copper mine near Wheatland caused a stir in mining circles in Wyoming, but a surprise equally as great was sprung today when news was brought to Cheyenne of a wonderfully rich dis covery of copper near Elk mountain in Carbon county.

The scene of this find is about seven teen miles south from Walcott, a small tation on the Union Pacific, east Rawlins, from which ore from the Rambler and Ferris-Haggarty mines at Battle lake is shipped to the smelter. Dana, another station on the Union Dana, another station on the Union Pacific, is only twelve miles from the new strike, while the grade stakes of the Burlington's Salt Lake line are less than half a mile from the mine.
