

## NEWS OF THE WEST.

A Great Plague of Crickets in Certain Quarters of Idaho.

## SAD END OF A SECTION FOREMAN.

A California Sheep Raiser's Remedy.—Oakland (Cal.) Miners and the Penitentiary Quarters, Etc.

Friends of advanced education are vigorously urging the establishment of a high school at Cheyenne, Col.

The Laramie Advances says the Chinese are doing all the ranch work near Cheyenne, to the detriment of the community.

Boys in Cheyenne, county are paying \$1000 a month in taxes, part, fire rent, for dogs, and salves have been large the past week.

Up to last week there had been shipped from Rawlins over \$47,000 worth of wool, the larger part consigned to Boston, committee houses.

Joe Yonanga, an Indian from Colon valley, has been sentenced at San Diego, to two years at San Quentin for assaulting a companion with a knife.

The first shipment of the spring to China from Arizona was made from Rawlins on Wednesday, May 19, nearly two weeks later than the first shipment last year.

According to the late school census, Sacramento shows a loss of 200 children, San Jose 1000, and Oakland 5000, a decrease. None of these places, however, is willing to confess to an actual decline of population.

During the year 1891, the output of Carbon county (Wyo.) coal mines was \$2,219 tons of lump and 940 tons of coke. In 1892, the output was 10,000 tons, the output of lump coal was 62,480 tons, and 16,260 tons of nut coal, employing 542 men.

The heavy rain throughout Arizona last week was something almost unprecedented in May, especially in the so-called desert region in the southern part of the territory. At Phoenix, the rainfall, after irrigated soil, the rainfall was 1.1 inches.

Columbus H. E. Limpsey has applied for a charter for a national bank to be established on a barge, which he purposes moving around on the lakes of northern Idaho to the mining towns, several of which need banking facilities though none of them can open a bank.

The Manito county court met last Monday, and what was the most interesting feature of the session was the trial of George W. Evans, who was seriously injured by being thrown from a horse. His head was shattered so badly by the fall that Dr. Nichols was sent for and performed the operation, removing several portions of bone. The same horse killed Deputy Brown about two months ago.

It is claimed by leading lawyers at Boise, Idaho, that there is a radical defect in the school law, as it will be impossible to get money from the state treasury for the support of schools. Auditor Ramsey says that he will not draw a warrant on the state treasury for money for this purpose until he is ordered to do so by the courts. Attorney General Parsons is of the same opinion, but they are somewhat at a standstill, but they are willing to sign contracts in spite of the defect in the law.

News has reached Yuma, A. T., through some prospectors from toward the gulf on the California side of the river that the have found a man about twenty miles from Alameda under a rock ledge, half buried. They carried him to their camp, where he was delirious and never recovered consciousness, dying in the morning. No papers were found on him by which he could be identified, as he had been known to many. He was well dressed and the men think he must have been a Mexican who ran off on the edge of the desert.

Wm. Hayes, section foreman, at Weston, was killed about a mile east of Fort Steele, Wyoming, at 12:45 yesterday afternoon. At the time of the accident he was sitting on the south end of the track, resting his head upon his right hand, facing west. The point of the engine on a westbound extra struck him upon the shoulder and head. He was evidently asleep at the time, as the engine did not stop. He had been suffering no convulsions with an ear trouble. An inquest was held last evening, but the jury had not returned a verdict at a late hour.

A tumor, known in medical science as a lipoma, one and a half by ten inches in size, has been removed from the tip of the head of Carl Hansen, a leading citizen, Sampson county, by Dr. H. J. Miller, of Sioux City. The operation, the removal of which was performed in a few minutes, resulted in less than twenty minutes. Glands and other local adenomata were also pulled, and the skin was cut in such a manner as to avoid the principal blood vessels. As the tumor, however, the tumor was taken out. The patient suffered comparatively little pain while under the hands of the doctor.

A California sheep raiser says an exchange, accepted the following plan to protect lamb from being devoured

by coyotes, and with success. He taught the lamb to sleep for eight or ten hours at a time, and around this he knotted intervals of one hundred yards. About twelve o'clock he would be roused from sleep each evening, and in order to make the animal sufficiently active as a fight to ensue, he would change the position of the several lights in the stable, so as to throw the animal into the darkness. In this manner he saved his tame from coyotes, while his near range neighbor, who was not so provident, suffered losses by them.

The grasshoppers have laid eggs in millions in places. They seem to have generally chosen the soil made by wash-walls because these sites with their arid air are the best place for them. At a time when the locusts have turned over quantities of earth in their nests.
