OUEER CHARGE AGAINST DOWIE.

It is That He Had Agreed to Turn Zion City Over to the "Mormon" Church.

HE WILL NOT FLEE TO MEXICO

He Will Wage a Vigorous Legal War To Obtain Control of Things Again.

Chicago, April 12 .- One of the charges that has been brought against Dowie-that to the effect that he had agreed secretly with a commission of "Mormon" missionaries to turn over to the "Mormon" Church Zion and all of its vast holdings, was emphatically denied by Dowle today.

The only possible basis for this story, it was explained, was that some mnoths ago a coterie of "Mormon" missionaries appeared in Zion City and distributed pamphlets expounding the doctrines of "Mormonism." According to the statement of Dr. Dowle and his counselors, these men were immediately thrown out of the city.

Dowie was today deserted by his personal attendant, David Murdock, who has been with him for years. The eason is that Murdock's father has cone over to Voliva.

John Alexander Dowle will not tail and flee to Mexico.
