THE BOSTON CON.

Company's Attitude Said to Strengthen Story of Impending Deal.

Discussing the Boston Con., which rumor says, may shortly become a part of the Amalgamated Copper company's possessions, an eastern publication says that when its representative was in Salt Lake a few weeks ago, "the company's local management claimed that the property was then opened sufficient. ly to warrant the erection of a smelter instead of only shipping 250 tons pe day to the Bingham smelter. It was intimated that the directors would im-

intimated that the directors would immediately consider the subject of not only building a smelter, but a concentrator to handle the porphyry, of which the Boston Con has 150 acres.

"The directors met, but instead of taking action toward the erection of its own reduction plant or the securing of increased smelter facilities elsewhere to take advantage of the Li-cent copper market, they decided to immediately increase the working forces and open the crease the working forces and open the

property upon a large scale. "As Managing Director Newhouse reported last year, to the shareholders, that there were opened up in the property 1,709,000 tons of ore, and the 100 men working in the mine have more than opened up new ore to take the place of the 75,000 tons which have been shipped to the Bingham smelter during the past 16 months, this latest action cide with the report that the property is being prepared for a sale and that it would be sold on the basis of the amount of ore opened up and in sight.

At present the product of the Boston Consolidated company is all coming from the Work tunnel and 60 feet below. Managing Director Newhouse is authority for the statement that in the Peabody tunnel the ore body is suffi-ciently opened to produce 500 to 600 tons per day; the Peabody tunnel can accommodate 200 men who can take out

#### A STRANGE RULING.

Tennessee Court Helds That Polsonous Smoke is Not a Nuisance.

Knoxville, Tenn., Nov. 26 .- The Ten-ROXVIIIe, Tenn., Nov. 26.—The ren-nessee supreme court today held as unconstitutional an act of the legis-lature of 1891 relative to the non-liability of certain corporations from damage alleged 10 accrue to vegeta-tion from smoke from copper roasting ovens in the Ducktown, Tenn., copper belt. The decision is in favor of the several copper companies at Ducktown, and dissolves a perpetual injunction granted by a lower court inhibiting the operation of copper roasting beds on the ground that they are nuisances. The supreme court held that they are not nuisances and that damages cannot be recovered as a result of the failure of vegetation to thrive thereabouts.

#### PUSHING ZINC PLANT. That at Horn Silver Being Rushed to

Speedy Completion.

According to Manager P. T. Farnsorth, the plant now being erected at Horn Silver is a monster, covering as it does a large area of surface and dooming up on the scene like a veritable leviathan of the high seas. # REPRESENTATION

Eastern Shareholders in Daly-West Want to be Heard.

#### ARE NOW MUSTERING STRENGTH

Suggestion That Monthly Dividends Will be Reduced from 40 to 20 Cents a Share.

Advices from the east indicate that eastern shareholders are ambitious to dictate the policy of the Daly-West, and that at the annual meeting in January, they will present a strong front and demand representation on the board of directors. This move is backed by what is termed - the "protective" committee of Cincinnati, which proposes to cut the monthly dividend from 40 to 20 cents a share. Discussing the matter the New York Commercial has this to say:

"What attitude the present board of directors will take toward this policy of giving outside interests recognition is not known, though it is not believed that serious objection will be made, inasmuch as all of the reports of this company have been particularly clear. However, it is possible that a fight will

result over this new move.
"The opinion is likewise freely expressed among those identified with the company that the disbursement for the month of December will mark the last 40 cents a share dividend that the company will pay for some time. It is known that the declaration of that divdend would have been abandoned sev-eral months ago had not the directors desired to fulfill the promise made by one of the company's officials in the early part of 1904 that the 40-cent dividend would continue till the end of the year. The dividend in January will probably be cut to 25 or 20 cents per share, and the opinion is expressed that this payment can be kept up without straining the production of the mine, relying upon the lower grade silver-

lead ores to earn enough to pay the dividend and put aside a small surplus. "Those familiar with the Daly-West company and its operations do not hes-itate to say that from now on, unless developments reveal new ore bodies, the substantial production of the property will come from its low-grade con-centrating ore. There is said to be ore of this character blocked out for at least the next four years, while there it not much high-grade rock left.

The committee at Cincinnati has decided to make a thorough investiga-tion of the mine, and its ore reserves. To this end the shareholders there have levied an assessment of 10 cents a share on all of the stock which they hold to defray the cost of experting the mine. It is in connection with this investigation and likewise with the buying of stock that the report has developed that the next move after completing an examination of the mine will be asked

for official representation on the board.
"The Daly-West mine has thus far paid \$4,381,000 in dividends, of which \$900,000 have been paid since January,

#### UNION PACIFIC WAS HAMMERED

Active Demand for Southern Group Resulted in Prominent Railroads Exhibiting Strength.

New York, Nov. 28 .- The industrials and specialties were prominent in the opening dealings of the stock market today and made some sharp gains, Amalgamated Copper was the only exception in that department with a decline of 14. The United States Steel stocks were the feature of the market with heavy sales. Trading during the first hour was much confused and the market was without any uniform tendency. Most of the favorite stocks were under pressure at one time or another while the movement of other stocks was strongly upward. The various metal stocks outside of United States Steel showed consistent strength. Republic Steel preferred rose 2 and American Car, Locomotive, Smelting, Colorado Fuel, Rallway Steel Spring preferred and Pressed Steel Car pre-terred 1 to 114. Westinghouse Electric ferred 1 to 1%. Westinghouse Electric Jumped 3. Sugar rose a point and fell more than a point under Saturday's close later. In the railroad list Missouri Pacific, Illinois Central, Erie second preferred and Rock Island sold up 1 to 1% and Great Northern 5. On the other hand, Atchison, Union Pacific and Louisville & Nashville were driven down a point. United States Steel preferred was liquidated heavily dropped to 94% and Amalgamated Copper lost a point. A rise of a point in Pennsylvania helped the general market only moderately. New York Central rose a point, Brooklyn Fransit and Metropolitan Street Railway 1%. Northwestern and Illinois Central 2 and Chicago Great Western preferred 24. Ann Arbor fell 2 and Wheeling & Lake Eric second preferred I. Prices were not maintained at noon,
