CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, 2.—Windom, from
the committee on transportation,
submitted the preamble and resolu-
tions, agreed on by the commit-
tee, for the improvement of the
proposed route for the improve-
ment of certain water routes.

Legals called up the bill to au-
thorize the Seneca nation of In-
dians, in New York, to lease lands
within the Cattaraugus and Alleghany
reservations, and to confirm the
existing leases. A long discus-
sion ensued, McCree, of Hamilton,
of Texas, opposing the bill as
part of a scheme to swindle these
indians of lands they had held
peaceably for 99 years and the title
to which was not now and never
was in the U. S. Hamilton pre-
sented a petition from the Indians
against the proposed bill, and Mc-
Cree moved to recommit it, but In-
galls defended the bill and it was
finally passed 23 to 17. After an
executive session, the Senate ad-
journed.

HOUSE.
An Intensely Interesting Time.
The Rules Amended.

The House resumed its session at
ten a.m.

Butler, of Mass., moved to sus-
pend the rules so as to give the
committee on rules a majority as it
has always observed compromises
of the constitution.

The Speaker came down on the
floor and spoke in answer to the
floor as reported by Garfield, as a
preventive of filibustering, which
was of comparatively modern
date, and which had been rejected
wrong. He also opposed the
amendment of Cessna, to allow the
judiciary committee to report at
any time, as there was no necessity
for it; because the select commit-
tees on the affairs of Mississippi,
Louisiana and Alabama have a
right to report at any time, and
Kasson's amendment was rejected,
and the rule was adopted, 171
yeas, 90 nays.

Butler, of Mass., moved to go to
the business on the speaker's table,
to take up the Senate civil rights
bill.

Ward, of N. J., moved to suspend
the rules and pass a bill giving the
bears of soldiers killed in battle who
had enlisted for less than a year the
same bounty as if they had en-
listed for three years; without ac-
tion on either motion the House
adjourned.

EASTERN.
A New Governor for Colorado.

WASHINGTON, 2.—Col. Routt, of
Ills., second assistant postmaster
general, will be appointed Govern-
or of Colorado, in place of Mc-
Cook, who will resign.

The People's Savings Bank.
ST. LOUIS, 2.—The acting pres-
ident and secretary of the People's
Savings Institution, to-day, assign-
ed the bank to I. H. Fiske, ex-
ecutive of the affairs has yet been
made.

The Investigation—Sheridan
Leaves New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, 2.—The congres-
sional committee, to-day, examined
General Badger, Chief of Police,
who gave a history of the four-
teenth of September troubles, and
Prosecuting Attorney Beckwith,
who related the story of the Con-
stitutional mass meeting and new
features in either case were elicited.

General Sheridan and staff left
to-day, for Vicksburg. It is
understood that they will not re-
turn here until the department of the
Missouri will be re-established at
Chicago.

WESTERN.
Left for Homo-Hawaiian Reciprocity
Treaty.

SAN FRANCISCO, 2.—King Kalakaua
and suite, and the U. S. minis-
ter, Mr. Cleveland, left to-day
on the U. S. steamer Penacola
for Honolulu. The Penacola was
escorted down the bay by the
U. S. steamer McPherson, on board
of which were General Sherman
and staff. The steamer was saluted
from the forts with a royal salute.

Among the passengers on the Pen-
acola is Col. A. B. Steinberger,
special commissioner of the U. S.
to the Samoan Islands. He visited
the islands about a year ago, and
was absolutely close relations
between the islands and the
U. S. This time the islands will
probably be taken under the pro-
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
