LOCAL BRIEFS.

Mrs. E. O'Reilly has sold out her main street clothing store to W. L. Nicol, who will continue the business which was started 22 years ago.

Charles T. Hart, formerly city editor of the Herald of this city, has bought the Rupert, Ida., Record, and will embark in the profession there.

An old-time calico ball will be given in the nineteenth ward hall Thursday evening. Women must wear calico dresses, and the men calico neckties.

Evangelist W. E. Coburn spoke on Paul's visit to Rome, last night, in the First Baptist church. The lecture was illustrated with stereopticon views.

Three horses belonging to the Salt Lake Ice company, and valued at \$700, broke through the ice on the Oguzur pond yesterday, and the drowned despite all efforts to save them.

At Thursday morning's session of the history section of the Ladies' Literary club, Mrs. Boxrud will read a paper on "The Subjugation of the Greek Colonies before the Median Wars."

At yesterday afternoon's meeting of the Bay View Reading club Mrs. W. H. Tibbals read a paper on the world's famous pictures, and Mrs. L. R. Hanchett reviewed the life of Charlemagne.

Street Car Conductor H. M. McCune slipped and fell from a car vestibule in Friday night's blizzard, and dislocated two fingers on the left hand, cut his face and otherwise bruised himself.

William Barrington of this city is exhibiting numerous specimens of turquoise from his mine southwest of this city, and which he has cut and polished in various forms and given gold settings.

Private Michael F. Gorman of K company, Eleventh Infantry, was arrested in this city yesterday afternoon, on the charge of desertion, and turned over to the military authorities at Fort Douglas by Police Officer Morris.

Second Lieut. Benjamin E. Grey of 1 company, Twenty-ninth Infantry, stationed at Whipple barracks, has been selected by the war department for duty at West Point military academy, from which the lieutenant graduated in 1902.

Fish Commissioner John Sharp is after the violators of the law on the south side of Bear Lake, where pond nets and traps have been set to clean out the fish from the lake. As that immediate section is in Utah, Mr. Sharp has ample jurisdiction.

The management of the Orpheum building has erected over the State street front, an 11 foot high zinc statue of the Muse of Music, weighing 550 pounds, and which was manufactured at Salem, O. The statue presents quite an imposing figure from the street.

A number of Utah students are attending the San Francisco college of physicians and surgeons, where a fire occurred recently, but fortunately none was affected, as far as can be ascertained. The students are Elsie A. Faust, Parley P. Musser, C. L. Sandberg, George V. Schramm, brother of the Salt Lake druggist, all of this city. W. Crawshaw, John Powers and a young man named Wardleigh of Ogden. The damage to the institution amounted to \$5,000.

The designation "State Prison" has been removed from the roof and signs of the street cars running to that delectable resort, and "Sugar House" substituted. This has caused a little temporary confusion, so that people waiting to go down into that part of the town have unwittingly allowed prison cars to pass them. But Manager Campbell says that he was asked to make the change by many residents of Sugar House ward, who objected to the sign as carrying an offensive significance.

Two of the new cars of the street railway service were put into commission Sunday, on the Murray line, where they did very well, to the gratification of the management. The Murray line will have all new cars, as soon as the rest are fitted up. They are very serviceable cars, with seats at the ends of the car parallel with the sides of the car, while the seats between are crosswise. The vestibules are larger, the steps nearer the ground, and the interiors more commodious and generally more convenient.

The funeral of the late George D. Inman was held Sunday afternoon from Knights of Pythias hall, under the auspices of the Order of the Elks and the Eagles. Addresses were delivered by Rev. F. E. Eddy for the Eagles and Ben D. Luce for the Elks, and the Unity quartet, composed of Misses Nellie Mahan and Emily Larson, and A. C. Mahan and Joseph Polk furnished the music. The Eagles conducted the service at Mt. Olivet cemetery, where a large tent was erected over the grave, and the quartet sang.

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CONFERENCE IN STATE ARMOY.

The Hall Granted for Sessions of The "See America First" Gathering.

OPENS THURSDAY MORNING.

Delegates Already Arriving and Indications Point to a Large Attendance.

The conference on "See America First" will be held in Armory hall, the use of which has been granted by the military authorities, and will be called to order at 10 a. m., Thursday next by Ex-Gov. Heber M. Wells, president of the Salt Lake Commercial club. Gov. Cutler is to welcome the visitors in behalf of the State of Utah, and other addresses of welcome will be delivered by various officials. Gov. Geo. B. Chamberlain of Oregon will make the response, and then preside over the preliminary organization.

When the permanent officers shall have been chosen, Hon. Fisher Harris will present a plan formulated by the special committee of the Commercial club as the basis for action by the conference, and the same will be printed in convenient form for reference. A feature of the day will be an address by Dr. Roland D. Grant of Vancouver, B. C., an authority on climate and scenery.

The second day's proceedings will be given up to detailed discussion of the plan of action, including means of financing the same, and the selection of permanent officials and headquarters. The day's sessions will be pleasantly closed with the Tabernacle concert, and on Friday night comes the banquet at the Commercial club. Delegates are beginning to arrive, and a splendid attendance is promised.

BOOSTING THE FAIR.
Pres. McDonald Receives Assurances of Hearty Support.

President J. G. McDonald of the D. A. & M. society has postponed his southern California trip in order to remain over in this city during the "See America First" conference, and have a talk with visiting governors of other intermountain states and how they feel with reference to participating in the proposed intermountain fair for 1907. He had a talk last evening with a number of delegates to the conference already on the ground, and was assured of their hearty cooperation. Then the officers of both the National Livestock association and the Utah Livestock association, and the Utah Poultry association, are in sympathy with the proposition, and will do what they can to help.

1002—Death of Otto III, king of Italy and emperor of the west.

1806—William Pitt, the younger, British statesman, died at age 76.

1806—The talented son of the great Chatham entered parliament at the age of 22.

Two years later he became prime minister and had to contend against Fox, Burke, North and Sheridan. Being defeated in parliament, he appealed to the people, and triumph and soon became the most powerful commoner in Europe.

1812—George Clymer, "signer" for Pennsylvania, died at age 77.

1865—Dr. Alfred L. Loomis, noted medical professor and practitioner, died in New York city, born 1831. Gen. Stephen V. Benet, U. S. A., retired, died in Washington; born 1827.
