Brakeman Instantly Killed and the Engineer is Missing.

Gold Run, Cal., March 9.—A fatal ex-plosion of engine No. 2617 occurred be-tween this place and Cape Horn tonight on the Central Paelfe, causing the in-stant death of Brakeman W. P. Frazer of Sharamento, Engineer F. D. Doran of Rocklin is missing and is supposed to be dead and covered up in the im-mense pile of debris. Fireman G. F.
