FIRED BULLET INTO HIS BRAIN.

Henry T. McMahon, Mining and Sheep Man, Commits Suicide in Ogden Rooming House.

WAS DELIBERATELY PLANNED.

Left Deposit Slip for \$150 With Which To Ship Remains to Ontario, Oregon.

Ogden, Nov. 17.—After carefully planning for his death, and even going so far as to enclose a deposit slip for \$150 to the local office of Odd Fellows, with the request that it be used to ship his remains back to Ontario, Oregon, Henry T. McMahon committed suicide last night. He accomplished the deed by shooting himself through the head, in his room at the Boulanger rooming house, putting a 35-caliber Colt's revolver in his mouth and firing towards the top of his head. The bullet failed to penetrate the skull and is now lodged in the head.

McMahon arrived here yesterday from Elko, Nev., in company with his brother, Charles. The two men have been companions for 20 years in the west engaging in mining and sheep raising enterprises together. Charles was with Henry last night until 10 o'clock and then parted with him on the best of terms and with no intimation that his brother was contemplating suicide, or even was in a gloomy mood.

WOMAN IN THE CASE.

Henry went right to his room, after telling his brother he was going to a restaurant, and wrote two letters, one to the Odd Fellows, enclosing the \$150, and the other to a newspaper. The contents of this second letter have not been made public. He then took off his coat and vest, laid down on the bed and fired the fatal shot. The landlady heard it, but thought it was outside of the building and paid but little attention to it. The brother on coming to the room at midnight, discovered the body, and summoned the officers. After a close scrutiny of the place the body was transferred to Larimer's undertaking parlors. Judge Murray is considering the advisability of holding an inquest, and when his decision is announced, the body will be shipped to Ontario for interment, as requested by the dead man. Charles McMahon states that his brother had no financial troubles, and had plenty of money. He thinks there was a woman in the case.

DISTRICT COURT HEARINGS.

Complicated Dispute Over the Ownership of a Horse—Other Matters.

Ogden, Nov. 17.—The case of Walter F. Reid against Lyman Skeen, is a suit brought by plaintiff to secure title to a bay horse, over which considerable trouble has been the past year. Reid claims ownership of the horse, which was sold one day last summer at short sale and bought by defendant, who claims a legal interest in the horse. The day the horse was bought by Mr. Skeen he took it to Nelson & Fell's livery stable and put it up there. Shortly afterwards Reid and his attorney, Mr. D. Lessinger, went to the stable and told the horse. They were arrested for horse stealing but the case was dismissed and now it is being brought to the district court to settle the ownership. A large number of witnesses were examined yesterday and the further hearing of the case was continued to Saturday.

In the case of North Ogden Irrigation company against George A. Fuller et al, suit over title to certain waters of Ogden river, court to produce their evidence as to defendants Walker and Stallings was granted.

In the case of Eccles Lumber company against Am Horrocks administrator, the demurrer of defendant to plaintiff's complaint was sustained.

Ogden, Nov. 17.—At a special meeting of the City Council last night the Rio Grande Western Railway company was granted a franchise to build tracks across Twenty-second, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, between Wall and Lincoln avenues.

The railroad company is given permission by the franchise to maintain three separate tracks over the streets mentioned for a period of 50 years, the company to pave the tracks between the rails and two feet to the outside with the same kind of pavement as the streets may be paved with. STRAWBERRY PROJECT.

Water Users Association Directors Sign Contract With Government.

Provo, Utah, Nov. 17.—The Strawberry Valley Water Users' association held a meeting in Spanish Fork last Monday, which it is believed removes any obstacle that may have stood in the way of the completion of the Strawberry irrigation project designed by the arid lands reclamation service to bring the district court to settle the ownership. State Senator Gardner was the chairman of the meeting, and Engineer Swenson, representing the reclamation service, was present to make explanation of matters not understood by the members of the association. The organization is composed of landowners whose lands are expected to be benefited by the irrigation project, and shares are determined by the land owned by each member, one acre giving the ownership of one share of stock. The contract which the government requires the land owners to enter into before construction work begins—the preliminary work of surveys and estimates has already been done by the engineers of the reclamation service—were discussed and considered, and an unanimous acceptance of the contract was the result, a vote by ballot being taken on the proposition.

Thirty-two thousand shares or acres of the 52,000 owned by the association, were represented at the meeting, and the directors were authorized to sign the contract in behalf of the association. This has been done, and the signed contract forwarded to the secretary of the interior. It is now expected that work on the project will be commenced at an early date as practicable. The completion of the work will not only be of great benefit to Utah county farmers, but will increase the water of Utah lake and give an increased supply from that source to Salt Lake county farmers.

WILLIAM GREENWELL DEAD.

Honored Veteran of 81 Goes to His Reward.

Ogden, Nov. 17.—Death has claimed William Greenwell, another of Ogden's aged and highly respected residents, who passed peacefully away from dropsy yesterday afternoon at 2:40 at the home of his son George H. Greenwell, 221 Twenty-second street. He was born at Dunterbossett, Leicestershire, England, Sept. 17, 1821. He accepted the Latter-day Saints' faith in his native land and emigrated to Utah in 1879, coming to Ogden where he has resided ever since. For a number of years he was actively associated with his son George H. Greenwell in the brick manufacturing and contracting business. He was a man of genial nature, sociable and kind and has a host of friends who will sorrow in his death. He is survived by five children, Catherine, James, George H., John H. and Fred Greenwell, all of Ogden, also 37 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. The time and place of funeral will be announced later.

HUSBAND COMMITTED SUICIDE.

Thought He Had Killed His Wife, But She Only Fainted.

St. Apollonia, Que., Nov. 17.—Believing that he had murdered his wife, Alexander Labrie, a wealthy farmer, yesterday committed suicide. The couple had quarrelled and in a fit of rage Labrie picked up a gun and fired. Mrs. Labrie fell to the floor in a faint, and Labrie, believing her to be dead, fired a second shot. A neighbor found Mrs. Labrie unconscious but uninjured.

LIFE INSURANCE CONTROL.

President Will Discuss Question in His Forthcoming Message.

Washington, Nov. 16.—Senator Dryden of New Jersey, who is president of one of the largest life insurance companies in the country, had a talk with the president today on the subject of insurance, which the president will discuss freely in his forthcoming message to Congress.

Senator Dryden will introduce at the approaching session a bill providing for federal supervision of life insurance. It will differ in some respects from the measure Mr. Dryden introduced in the last Congress, but the principle will be the same. He indicated, in response to inquiries, that the supreme court never had passed upon the constitutionality of a federal law regulating insurance, although it had had under consideration cases involving purely state laws that interfere with insurance was not interstate commerce.

A FALSE EMPEROR HAS APPEARED IN RUSSIA.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 16, 5:45 p. m.—A false emperor has suddenly made his appearance near Penza and already his followers number 50,000. This is the startling report received this afternoon in a dispatch from Simbirsk.

Penza is in the heart of the vast region extending westward from the Volga where agrarian uprisings on a large scale have been occurring and if the report turns out to be true that the pretender to the throne has placed himself at the head of the peasantry the government will soon face, besides its other troubles, a formidable agrarian rebellion. It is required a year to suppress the famous rebellion led by Pugatcheff, who impersonated the dethroned and murdered Peter III, in the time of Catherine II. That uprising was started in the same region on the banks of the Volga.
