Already committed to the corporation fax, he was anxious that the house conferences should understand that this tax is purely an administration meas-ure.

The senate conferees have suggested to the president that he send personally for senators to whom pledges to stand firm have been given by the senate conferees. The conferees told the presi-dent that if the senators would re-tere the conferees from their pledges lease the conferees from their pledgas the latter would be glad to accept the lower rates. New York, July 16.—The solicitor of the treasury has decided that plumes of the white heron, called aigrets, and worn mostly on the hats of women, cannot be sold even by the government in the state of New York. Collector Loeb had announced that aigrets val-ued at about \$1,000, which were smug-gled into this port by stewards of the steamships Tennyson and Verdi from Brazil in April and May, and selzed by customs inspectors, were to be sold at public auction. A professor of the National Association of Audubon So-cieties wrote a letter to the collector protesting against the sale on the ground that "it is against the public ground that "it is against the public

The collector cogitated and put the problem up to the secretary of the treasury, who in turn referred it to the solicitor. interest.

The solicitor declared that the algrets should be destroyed by the collector. Inasmuch as under the laws of this state it is a misdemeanor to sell plumage of the heron, the solicitor decides that government officials have no more right to sell it than any indi-vidual citizen.
