WELL DONE.

The wisdom of vesting the veto power in the executive has been frequently mentioned in the respective States as well as in the Nation. The check on the "executive power" provided in the two-thirds vote to override a veto is sufficient to prevent arbitrary action, and the bond of a free citizenry and a controlling power over every legislature is demonstrated as every session of our law-making bodies.

This has received several illustrations recently in Utah. The exercise of the veto power by Governor Wells has been justly commended in the public interest. These vetoes just filed are to be highly commended.

The appropriation by the Legislature of money to aid in the erection of the Salt Palace was well intended but was contrary to the State Constitution, and the promoters of the project themselves declared they were able to push the enterprise without aid from the State treasury. The Governor's veto was rightly applied.

As to the printing bill, requiring the approval of the executive authority is a sound principle. The Governor has exercised his office in the city or county where they reside. The bill must have been framed by some one with little ability for the same, without proper understanding of its requirements. What would office and routine do where no newspaper or job office existed?

The veto by the Legislature without due consideration, and perhaps in some cases from a desire to carry favor with labor elements that are often rash and unwise in their demands. Eight hours time is enough for labor of any kind, but strenuousness often arises which makes heavy service indispensable, and the liberty of the worker ought not to be infringed, where it may be added to the demands of the employer.

"Labor agitation" often need to be professed against themselves, and certainly the real interests need to be saved from their arbitrary demands. The Governor's veto was also wisely applied in this instance.

The last day of the session was crowded with work that ought to have been done earlier. And the Legislature must see the practical wisdom in the veto of the bill that would have had the effect of nullifying the law of the State in relation to the printing of the State papers.
