

## PROGRESS ON THE CORBETT TUNNEL

Nearly Five Hundred Men Are Hard at Work on Big Project.

COMPLETED NEXT SEASON.

In Spite of High Wages Laborers Cannot be Secured in Big Horn Basin Country.

Cody, Wyo., Nov. 8.—Work is progressing rapidly on the government's Corbett irrigation tunnel, and it is reported from there that nearly 500 men are engaged in pushing the large bore as fast as possible. It is expected the tunnel will be completed in time to run water through for next season's crops. The tunnel will be 17,000 feet in length and will carry enough water to irrigate several thousand acres of land that lies on a big flat, north of the Shoshone river, and which is susceptible of raising enormous crops. Winter quarters for the men have been erected in and around Corbett, so that work can progress throughout the entire winter. The Bullion Construction company is also pushing work on the big government dam. Several hundred men are employed, together with a large number of teams. The diverting dam will be ready to divert all the water the Corbett tunnel can carry by the time the latter is completed.

**SERIOUS LABOR PROBLEM.**  
Meteteen, Wyo., Nov. 8.—Laborers cannot be secured in the Big Horn basin country in spite of the fact that high wages are being paid. By farmers, ranchmen, stockmen, stage lines, contractors and builders, and in all lines. They newspaper in this region carries advertisements for men, but laborers and skilled workmen do not answer the advertisements.

A number of large irrigation dams are under construction, but the builders have difficulty in obtaining sufficient horses and men to carry on operations. Thirty cents per hour is offered for ditch diggers and shovelers, but no one appears to be idle. This section is enjoying an era of great prosperity, but the real boom will not come until steps are taken to import more skilled mechanics, laborers and farm and ranch hands. The producing capacity of the farms and ranches is now limited by the scarcity of men to care for the crops, for farmers will not plant an acreage that they know cannot be handled.

### UNIONIST PARTY CARRIES DAY IN PORTO RICO.

San Juan, P. R., Nov. 7.—The Unionist party scored an overwhelming victory at the polls yesterday, carrying all the seven districts of the island. The Republicans are left without representation in the next house of delegates. The Unionists won in a majority of the municipalities, the Republicans merely saving San Juan. The Aretebo district, where the Federation of Labor made a concentrated effort, with the assistance of \$1,000 contributed by the American Federation of Labor, made a surprisingly insignificant showing, the vote cast amounting to practically nothing. The election evoked much enthusiasm, but there were no disturbances, and yesterday was the most orderly election day since the American occupation.

### SAN DOMINGO FINANCES.

Prof. Hollander Returns From Mission To Europe Regarding Them.

Baltimore, Nov. 7.—Prof. Jacob H. Hollander has returned after a three week trip to Europe, where he went on a special mission for the state department. Although Prof. Hollander declined today to discuss his trip in advance of his report to Washington, it is understood that the purpose of his visit abroad, to secure the assent of foreign creditors of Santo Domingo to a plan of adjustment of the claims against that republic, had been successful and that all the principal foreign creditors have assented to the terms proposed. The plan involves the continuance of customs of the Dominican republic during adjustment of debt. The treaty to this effect is still pending before the United States senate.

### SECY. TART IN NEBRASKA.

Deadwood, S. D., Nov. 7.—Secy. of War Tart spent today at Fort Robinson, Neb., inspecting that post. An effort has been made to have him and his party come to Fort Meade on a similar errand. The report is understood to be making the trip of posts with the intention of recommending to the president certain ones which shall be changed from regimental to brigade posts. In his party are (Gen. Humphreys, quartermaster-general; Gen. Grant, Gen. Barry and Representative Randall of Nebraska.

### OMAHA SUICIDE IDENTIFIED.

Omaha, Nov. 7.—A man who committed suicide in a hotel here last Sunday night was tonight identified as a patient in a hospital from a hospital in Council Bluffs a day or two previous. It is said the man had been known as Haggerty, but that his real name was supposed to be Delaney. Catholic priest, and that he was for 13 years in the Catholic church at Green River, Wyo. ### BANDITS HOLD UP ARMY WAGON.

Havana, Nov. 7.—A United States army wagon carrying a number of the engineers corps, was held up last night by bandits near Chianay. Upon learning that the wagon contained soldiers the bandits vanished into the woods before the men could fire. Rural guardsmen have been ordered to pursue and capture the bandits.

### NEGRO WOMAN MURDERED.

Pelham, Ga., Nov. 7.—The wife of Hicks the negro who killed John A. Akers last Sunday, was found dead in her room yesterday, having been killed by a night she was shot with over 20 bullets. On the same farm and not far away, a negro who it is claimed helped Hicks to escape, was found dead. He also had been shot several times. The coroner has notified Hicks has not been captured.

### SUCCESSFUL ASCENT OF MOUNT M'KINLEY.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 7.—Dr. Fredrick A. Cooke, of Brooklyn, explorer and mountain climber, is in Seattle on his way home after having made a successful ascent of Mount McKinley in Alaska. The Cooke party started May 15 and reached the summit of Mount McKinley Sept. 14. The party was composed of Dr. Cooke, Belmont Brown, of Tacoma; Walter Miller, of Seattle;

Professor H. C. Parker, of Columbia university; and R. W. Porter, of Boston, topographer. The expedition was a private enterprise on the part of Dr. Cooke, who is an explorer of note, having been a member of the Peary expedition of 1898. The chief results of the expedition are the location of the height of Mount McKinley as given by the government, 20,300 feet, and the opening up of a hitherto unknown section of about 3,000 miles known as the Yentia district.

### VALUABLE DOCUMENTS GONE.

London, Nov. 8.—According to the Vienna correspondent of the Daily

Telegraph, there is consternation in Budapest owing to the disappearance of a valise containing documents belonging to the Hungarian premier, Dr. Wekerle. The missing papers include two protocols of sittings of the ministerial council and numerous other important state papers. In political circles there is a suspicion of criminal manipulation, as one of the documents is the original text of the much discussed "pactum" between the emperor-kind and the members of the Hungarian coalition party concerning the military system. The loss of the valise was reported by a servant who had been charged to carry it to the railroad station. It is surmised, however, that it

was either stolen from the carriage or that the servant was bribed. Premier Wekerle was on the point of starting to Vienna, but when the loss was discovered he postponed his journey and informed the police.

### A CHANCELLOR CRISIS.

Count von Moltke May be Made Prince Von Buelow's Successor.  
New York, Nov. 8.—A Berlin special to the Times says it is believed there that what is known as a "chancellor crisis" is imminent. Leading news-

papers assert that Emperor William contemplates the appointment of Count von Moltke, chief of the general staff, as Prince Buelow's successor. A strong court canonist, led by Prince Philip von Eulenburg, who aided the emperor in writing the "Song to Aegir," is working against the present chancellor. The report that Buelow will retire is rendered the more probable on account of the condition of his health, which will hardly permit him to take part in the heated debates expected in the course of the coming session of the reichstag. ### M. PANKSEOFF EXPELLED.

Odesa, Nov. 8.—M. Pankseoff, vice president of the Odesa committee of the Constitutional Democrats, has been fined \$1,500 and ordered expelled from the city for as long as martial law remains in force because, without the permission of the authorities there was held in his house a meeting to discuss the approaching elections. Twenty-four others present, among whom were doctors, lawyers and several municipal councilors, were fined \$500 each with the alternative of imprisonment. Governor General Kaubers declares he will not allow meetings for electoral purposes, whether legal or illegal.
